

Father John P. O'Malley, 79, former Holy Cross pastor

Father John P. O'Malley, former pastor of Holy Cross Parish, Rochester, died of cancer Feb. 16, 1991, at St. Mary's Hospital. He was 79.



Born July 3, 1911, Father O'Malley attended Corpus Christi School, St. Andrew's Seminary and St. Bernard's Seminary. He was ordained June 6, 1936, by Archbishop (later Cardinal) Edward Mooney.

Father O'Malley served as assistant pastor at St. Ann's, Hornell, from 1936 to 1943. He was assigned to St. Francis of Assisi, Auburn, from March of 1943 to April of 1944, when he became a chaplain with the United States Army, eventually attaining the rank of captain.

After leaving military service, Father O'Malley was assigned as assistant pastor at Holy Apostles Parish, Rochester, in 1946. He remained at the parish until 1947, when he was assigned as assistant pastor at Holy Cross Parish.

Father O'Malley served at Holy Cross Parish until 1958, when he was appointed pastor of St. Mary's Parish, Bath.

In June of 1977, Father O'Malley returned to Holy Cross, this time as pastor. He remained there until his retirement on June 30, 1982.

From 1982 to 1988, Father O'Malley served as parochial vicar at Our Lady of Mercy Parish in Rochester.

In 1988, Father O'Malley became the chaplain at Bishop Kearney High School in Rochester. He had long been involved with

youth groups and activities, dating back to 1952 when he organized the Xavier Club, a teen/young-adult group.

Marilyn Timmons, a onetime member of the club, recalled that the group attracted members from parishes throughout Rochester. A Sacred Heart parishioner at the time, Timmons remembered Father O'Malley as "ever present ... encouraging, enthusiastic and smiling, even when things were not going well."

That interest in young people continued into Father O'Malley's later years, observed Bishop Dennis Hickey.

"(He) always had a youthful spirit," Bishop Hickey said. "He related well to the young. He roller skated with them when he was well along in years."

Illness forced Father O'Malley to leave Bishop Kearney on Dec. 20, 1990.

Mass of Christ the High Priest was celebrated Feb. 19, at Holy Cross Church, with interment at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery on Feb. 20.

Father O'Malley was predeceased by his parents, Patrick and Jane Flaherty O'Malley, and a sister, Mary O'Malley O'Ryan. He is survived by many cousins.

The family requests that expressions of sympathy be sent either to Father O'Malley's Early Childhood School Fund or to the Bishop Kearney Scholarship Fund.

Sr. Marian Elizabeth Shantz, RSM, longtime nurse

Sister Marian Elizabeth Shantz, RSM, died of pancreatic cancer Feb. 7, 1991, in Lourdes Hall, the Sisters of Mercy Motherhouse infirmary, 1437 Blossom Road, Rochester. She was 71.

A native Rochesterian, Sister Marian Elizabeth entered the Mercy congregation Sept. 8, 1938, taking the name Sister Elizabeth Anne. She professed perpetual vows on Aug. 23, 1944.

Sister Marian Elizabeth had been graduated from Our Lady of Mercy High School in 1938. She received a degree in registered nursing from Hornell's St. James Mercy Hospital School of Nursing in 1943. She earned a bachelor of science degree in nursing education in 1947 and a master of science degree in medical and

surgical nursing in 1963, both from the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. In 1968, she earned a public health-nurse certificate from the University of Rochester.

Involved in nursing as a student, instructor or nurse since 1940, Sister Marian Elizabeth was a science and clinical instructor at St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell from 1946-64, and a head nurse at St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester from 1964-65.

From 1967-70, Sister Marian Elizabeth was a public-health nurse for the Monroe County Health Department, and from 1970-76, was assistant professor of nursing with the State University of New York, teaching at various times at the Brockport,

Albany, Utica and Rome campuses. She was a staff nurse at Strong Memorial Hospital and a private duty nurse from 1976-86, and a clinical nurse specialist at Strong Hospital from 1986-90.

The Mass of Christian Burial for Sister Marian Elizabeth was celebrated Monday, Feb. 11, in the Sisters of Mercy Motherhouse chapel. Interment was at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

Sister Marian Elizabeth was predeceased by her bother, Father Raymond Shantz, CSSR, and by two sisters, Helen Villard and Mary Solomon. She is survived by four sisters: Sister Dorothy Marie Shantz, SSJ, Florence Vick and Geraldine Shantz, all of Rochester; and Barbara Kramer of Florida.

Sr. Francine Bochicchio, taught 50 years

Sister Francine Bochicchio, OSF, a former teacher and principal, died January 24, 1991, at St. Elizabeth Motherhouse in Allegany, N.Y. She was 89-years-old.

The former Margaret Bochicchio, Sister Francine was the daughter of the late Michael and Marie Louise Summa Bochicchio formerly of New York City.

She was received into the Congregation of the Franciscan Sisters of Allegany at St. Elizabeth Motherhouse on April 16, 1928, and professed her final religious vows on August 15, 1935.

Sister Francine served as both teacher and principal at St. Margaret Mary School in Rochester from 1937-1959.

After her tenure in Rochester, Sister Francine ministered as a teacher at St. An-

thon's School in New York City; St. Mary's School in Cortland; Holy Cross School in the Bronx; and St. Paul's School in Highland, N.J.

She retired to the St. Elizabeth Motherhouse in 1980.

Sister Francine is survived by four sisters, Claire and Lucy Bochicchio of New York City, Isabel Fulcher of Brooklyn, and Mary Valenti of San Carlos, Calif.; a brother, Anthony Bochicchio of Germany; and several nieces and nephews.

A wake service took place at St. Elizabeth Motherhouse on Jan. 25, followed by a Mass of Christian Burial on Jan. 26. Interment was at the St. Bonaventure Cemetery in Allegany.
