Mercy, Aquinas gain quarterfinal victories

With the elimination of Bishop Kearney, Geneva DeSales and Elmira Notre Dame from post-season basketball action, only two diocesan girls' basketball teams remain in the race for a sectional title.

After receiving a first-round bye in Section 5 Class A, second-seeded Our Lady of Mercy (17-3) advanced to the quarterfinal round where the Monarchs stung seventhseeded Rush-Henrietta, 59-36, on Feb. 22 at Penfield High School. R-H finished the season 8-12.

Although Mercy started out slowly in the first quarter — the Monarchs only scored 10 points but held the Royal Comets' to just two — Sheila Doyle sparked the offensive onslaught in the second quarter by pouring in nine of her 16 team-high points.

Mary Beth Cleary paced the Monarchs in the third quarter by scoring six of her 11 points.

Natalie White added 14 points and nine rebounds for Mercy, and Doyle also collected seven of the Monarchs' 17 steals.

Mercy faced No. 6 Brockport at Edison Tech on Feb. 26 in the semifinals. The winner of that game will play the winner of the other semifinal game between No. 1 Fairport and No. 4 Penfield in the Class A championship at the War Memorial on Thursday, Feb. 28, at 8:30 p.m.

In Section 5 Class BB, fourth-seeded Aquinas (15-6) ousted fifth-seeded Bishop Kearney, 44-33, on Feb. 23, at Hilton High School.

Amy Reynders tallied 17 points and 10 rebounds for AQ, while Jill Banaszewski collected 13 points and Mary Radford add-ed 10 for the Little Irish.

The quarterfinal win was the first sectional game for AQ, which drew a firstround bye. In order to advance to the Class BB finals, the Little Irish had to defeat topseeded Pittsford Mendon on Feb. 26 at Roberts Wesleyan College.

The Aquinas-Mendon winner will play

either No. 6 Churchville-Chili or No. 7 Victor in the Class BB Championship at the War Memorial at 6:45 p.m on Feb. 28.

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In the game against Aquinas, Kearney's Eileen Jensen provided the Kings' scoring punch in the paint. The senior poured in 16 points and 10 rebounds for Kearney.

Jenny Lynch collected seven points and Theresa Dudley scored five points and seven rebounds for Kearney.

Although BK Coach Paul Forte said he wished his team had played better against Aquinas, he added that the loss shouldn't take away from his players' accomplishments this season. Bishop Kearney finished the season 15-7 overall and 2-4 in the league.

Before losing to AQ, the Kings clobbered visiting and 12th-seeded Brighton, 69-38, on Feb. 19.

Kearney took an early lead and maintained it throughout the first-round game.

Jensen iced 16 points and 12 rebounds, Dawn Wiegand tallied 11 points and four rebounds, Lynch scored 10 points and sophomore Janet D'Agostino added nine points for the Kings.

In Section 5 Class D, the Geneva DeSales girls were eliminated from postseason play by No. 8 Houghton, 49-24, at Avoca High School on Feb. 19.

The Saints' first-round defeat was a result of shooting troubles, according to coach Steve Muzzi.


"We never got into our offense and we had a hard time stopping Houghton's Aimee Bence who had 29 points," explained Muzzi.

The Little Irish trailed by two points after the first quarter, 13-11, but tied the score, 22-22, at intermission.


Aquinas grabbed a three-point lead by the end of the third quarter, 40-37, but Franklin (12-7) rallied in the fourth period.
