Despite fine acting, comedies come up short

NEW YORK - When an accidental tragedy wipes out the entire British royal family, a good-natured American slob inherits the throne and becomes "King Ralph'' (Universal).

When he learns of the tragedy, Ralph (John Goodman), is a floundering Las Vegas lounge singer. He takes it as a joke when two proper British gentlemen, toting a one-way ticket to London, inform him he is the sole heir to the English crown.

But life in Buckingham Palace is not an easy fit for the cranky Yankee, who is forever trying to escape the attentions of his starchy private secretary, Willingham (Peter O'Toole). King Ralph is much more at home in an exotic dance dlub where he's met Miranda, an impoverished shop-girl (Camille Coduri).

Duty calls, however, and Ralph's expected to give up his commoner, woo the Princess of Finland (Joely Richardson) and undo a plot by smarmy Lord Graves (John Hurt) to dethrone him. He can't quite score a tripleheader on these counts, but with a little encouragement from Willingham, he meets his obligations in a manner befitting a king.

Writer/director David S. Ward directs a clash of cultures comedy that turns out to be equal parts affable and forgettable.

Goodman's likable enough in this minor league effort, but O'Toole and Hurt are wasted in roles in which they look stifled. In addition, O'Toole's dry delivery is far funnier than the dreary dialogue.

Some sprightly moments and sight gags capitalize on Goodman's enormous physical size, but the screenplay is soon mired in its one-joke situation. The high point of the film is the royal ball with the regally attired King Ralph breaking loose on the harpsichord with a rocking, stomping version of "Good Golly, Miss Molly.

The rest of this simpleminded diversion is lame and tame, though the overbearing musical score tries hard to make you feel emotionally touched and grandly giddy. This crowning touch makes the film's execution as oafish as King Ralph's impossible attempts to be a dignified British monarch.

Due to occasional vulgar expressions, double entendre and a flash of rear nudity, the U.S. Catholic Conference classification is A-II - adults and adolescents. The Motion Picture Association of America rating is PG — parental guidance suggested.

'Scenes From a Mall'

Bette Midler and Woody Allen play a seemingly ideal couple whose marriage splinters in the course of a day's shopping in "Scenes From a Mall" (Touchstone).

The kids are off for a ski weekend, so Deborah (Bette Midler) and Nick (Woody Allen) head for the mall to pick up their 16th anniversary presents and gourmet goodies for a dinner party.

Suddenly Nick volunteers he's just ended an affair with a woman and that he's been unfaithful with a few others, too. He rationalizes his actions by saying that sex with Deborah had become routine, but says he still loves her and expects instant forgiveness.

Instead, Deborah talks divorce, even though she's just published a book on keeping marriages-happy. He convinces her not

to contact an attorney since — being a lawyer himself — he knows how expensive they can be.

Soon Deborah is admitting she' wasn't exactly faithful either and for the rest of the day the dueling duo careen from hostility and screaming matches to hard-won insights and rekindled romance.

Better shop around before buying this marriage encounter session from cowriter, producer and director Paul Mazursky.

Fine acting and wry lines make for very realistic situations throughout the movie. But its visual interest is zilch. In fact, it would have worked better as a radio play - and a talky and eventually wearing one at that.

Mazursky picks an apt setting, where materialistic values are everything, for his look at the fragile state of contemporary marriages. Pampered by the good life for so many years, Nick and Deborah's values have become such that each can intellectually justify infidelity. But it's a different story when each learns how it feels to be the injured party.

Indeed, the apparently happy ending has a shallow ring. It seems that convenience, familiarity and fear of the singles scene will keep them together more than any genuine sense of renewal and commitment.

Because of adulterous references and minimal rough language, the USCC classification is A-III - adults. The MPAA rating is R - restricted.
