Drive offers chance to ponder events

On the way home from Immaculate Conception Church, Ithaca, last night, Father Paul Tomasso and I did what we usually do. Paul kindly bore with it, while I listened to the end of the New York Yankees/Detroit Tigers baseball game. (My beloved Yankees lost 10-5 after getting off to an early 5-0 lead.)

We talked about the events of the day and listened to some music on the car radio. This time we listened to a station that features old rock 'n' roll music. Paul deepens my knowledge of music on such occasions because he knows all the words and can identify most of the performing artists. He can usually date the songs, saying, "I was in second grade when that was

written." He then falls into silence, know ing full well I am calculating that I was half-way through the seminary at the time.

Silence is often a feature of such trips, as it was on the way home last night. Sometimes the silence lulls the passenger to sleep. At other times it becomes a privileged opportunity for the mind and spirit to rest, to explore the meaning of the day's events or, less frequently, to consider the tasks of tomorrow.

During the quiet moments last night, my spirit was very much with the congregation with which I had just celebrated the Eucharist and confirmations at Immaculate Conception. The event brought together candidates for confirmation, their families and friends from Immaculate Conception and

St. Catherine's in Ithaca, All Saints in Lansing, and Ithaca College. In addition, there were four candidates from a small and vibrant community of Korean Roman Catholics who are studying at Cornell.

- I believe there were a total of 58 candidates. Most came forward to be confirmed not only with their sponsors but with groups of family and friends. What a joy it was to welcome each of the candidates and somehow to participate in a moment when bonds of affection and streams of joy are so clearly evident. And, of course, the moment is one in which all are invited to remember the gift available to us in such precious sacramental moments.

The ages of the candidates ranged from high school sophomores through college students to doctoral candidates at Cornell University. They came from three of our parishes, almost every diocese in our state, several other northern states, Korea and Germany.

That kind of variety made so real for me the fact that when we gather for worship, Christ is present not only in the Scriptures and in the Eucharist but also in the assembly. I do truly believe that we are a holy




