Yesterday — April 29, the Feast of St. Catherine of Siena - marked the ninth anniversary of the publication of Fire in the Thornbush, our diocesan pastoral letter on women in our church. Shortly after its publication here it was published in Origins, a documentary service of Catholic News Service, under the title "American Catholic Women: Strong Faith, Persistent Ouestions.

During the nine years of its life, the letter has enjoyed a wide circulation, and even now we get an occasional letter requesting a copy of it. Most recently, a teacher at a Midwestern college wanted a copy for use in her classes.

Because that project is for a national group, the effort has taken a much longer time to prepare than did our diocesan letter. We are coming toward the end, but between now and then there is considerable work to be done. I'll keep you informed on it as the work progresses.

In the meantime, please let me encourage you to reread Fire in the Thornbush, if you still have a copy. I did so recently and was left with the strong impression that there are some challenges in it that we, as a church, have not yet fully met. Among those challenges are some that will require a commitment to change on the part of the wider church. I refer to such matters as jurisdiction, preaching, ordination, etc.

But in other areas change is possible but elusive. I refer to changes in attitudes and habits that tend to exclude women from full participation in the daily life and activities of our church, especially those that set directions or are influential in other ways.

Most of the wonderful women and men who contributed to the development of Fire in the Thornbush are still very much active in our local church. I never remember the anniversary without remembering them with great gratitude. Thanks; dear friends; for your work then and now.

Exchange students come from Sweden, Norway, Denmark, Finland, Holland, Switzerland, Germany, Spain, France, Italy, Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia, Brazil, Ecuador, Japan and Australia.

The students, ages 15 through 17, will arrive in the United States in August, 1991, attend a local high school, and return to their home countries in June, 1992. Students are fluent in English, have been screened by representatives in their home countries. They have spending money and medical insurance.

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
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
