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year by establishing two sections of a grade, only to see both sections shrink after previously enrolled students dropped out following registration. This left some schools with two teachers on the payroll for a grade, even though one teacher could have instructed a single consolidated class, he said.

Among other measures the quadrant governing board plans to take to avoid a budget deficit are:

- Reviewing enrollment trends to see if further consolidation in the quadrant will be needed. The board will make any recommendation for further consolidation by this fall.
- Building into the quadrant budget a 5-percent allowance for uncollected tuition revenue from non-parishioner parents. Parishes often pick up the tab for tuition revenue that a quadrant doesn't collect

In fact, Leary reported, the association's membership is increasing, and current members are renewing at higher levels.

"We do regret that there are people who are unhappy with our actions," Leary said. But, she added, "I really don't have any reservations at all about the plans that we've made."

An official of St. Mary's Hospital said the Catholic hospital will remain a member of the 19th Ward Community Association.

Dawn Borgeest, the hospital's director of public affairs, pointed out that St. Mary's had publicly stated its strong opposition to the leasing of office space to Planned Parenthood. Hospital officials,

from parishioner parents, but no such mechanism exists to cushion lost revenue from school parents who don't belong to a parish, the superintendent said. He said the 5-percent figure is based on the amount of revenue the quadrant lost from non-parishioner school parents in 1990-91.

• Creating a common definition of "parishioner" among quadrant parishes for the purpose of setting parish subsidies. Since non-parishioners pay a higher rate of tuition than parishioners do, Brother Walsh noted, some parents identify themselves as members of a parish they do not really attend. And in the process, parishes may be assessed for students whose families are not members of the parish.

In addition, the Northeast Quadrant Governing Board will establish a development subcommittee to coordinate fundraising activities. The goal of these efforts, Brother Walsh said, is to raise more than 2 percent of the cost of educating all the students through fundraising.

she said, will continue efforts to talk with the association "to seek some kind of resolution to the issue."

But, Borgeest added, St. Mary's will remain in the association because "the group is one we respect and one we've been involved with for many years. We feel that we are a major resource in the neighborhood, as are they, and we think that we should continue to work together for the good of the people in the neighborhood."

On the other hand, Father Louis Sirianni, pastor of Our Lady of Good Counsel Church, reported that his parish council voted unanimously April 15 to leave the association.

"We believe Planned Parenthood's policies are not consistent with our policies and with the policies of the Catholic Church," the priest said.

Members of the parish council had discussed remaining with the association to oppose Planned Parenthood from within,

but opted instead for the "witness value" of leaving, Father Sirianni said.

"We felt we could fight just as strongly on the outside in a variety of ways," Father Sirianni added.

In choosing to remain a member, on the other hand, St. Monica's Parish is seeking to oppose any future actions of this sort by the association, noted Father Robert Gaudio, pastor.

"We disagree very strongly with the decision," Father Gaudio explained. "We believe that the decision is going to be very destructive to the community."

Nevertheless, Father Gaudio said, parish leaders chose to remain a member organization. "We wanted to continue to have a strong voice in what happens in the organization and the neighborhood."

If Maher's group does mount protests against the lease arrangement, Father Gaudio said, "We would put that before the community as a whole and encourage parishioners as individuals to take part."
