Czech ambassador to give talk at Fisher

ROCHESTER — Dr. Rita Klimova, the Czechoslovakian ambassador to the United States, will be the principal speaker at St. John Fisher College's 37th commencement at 1 p.m. on Sunday, May 19. Klimova will receive an honorary degree during the ceremony.

Born in Czechoslovakia in 1931, Klimova immigrated to this country with her parents in 1939 to escape the Nazis. She lived in New York City until 1946, when she returned with her family to Prague. She completed her education in her native land, obtaining a master's degree and doctorate in economics from

the Prague School of Economics. She became a lecturer at the prestigious Charles University in Prague, and also was active in the Communist Party.

As Czechoslovakia's economy stagnated in the 1960s, Klimova began examining Western economic theories. She slowly dissolved her ties to communism. After becoming an active dissident, she was purged from the party after strongly opposing the Soviet invasion of her homeland in

Demoted from her lecturer's position to a spot in the university's accounting office, she eventually was fired in 1970 and turned to working as a freelance English interpreter. She later served as the English voice of Civic Forum, the movement that led the toppling of the communist government. Klimova was named ambassador in


