Teen in Owego promotes faith among peers

OWEGO - If Melissa Laubach stood up and talked to her peers at St. Patrick's Church, she said she would speak about morals.

'Morals represent your beliefs and what you should be doing," said the senior at Owego Free Academy. "Until you know your morals and go by what you believe, nothing is going to change. You have to know yourself before you can help anyone else.'

The 18-year-old Catholic exemplifies youths' involvement in the church and the idealistic visions they have for the future church. In addition to her responsibilities as peer minister and youth-group leader, Melissa has already begun planning for that future by preparing younger members of the parish to serve in the church.

As one of the two youths on St. Patrick's parish council, Melissa said she joined the council when she began thinking about how high school students could be more helpful in the church.

In the spring of 1990, Melissa learned that her pastor, Father William G. Darling, needed help in coordinating several parish projects. The priest, a member of the Army reserves, was preparing for possible departure to Persian Gulf war.

she has been given the chance to see the inner workings of the church. Although she is young, Melissa said she already has some ideas of things she would like to change.

"I would like them (adults) to listen more to what teens have to say," said Melissa, one of the youths to receive a Hand of Christ Award in April. "We are the ones who are going to be here for the rest of our lives and they are not."

Melissa added that she would like to see women have a greater role in today's church. She also thinks women should be able to become priests.

"I think women as priests would be great. I don't think we get enough credit," explained Melissa, who remembered how infuriated she became years ago when she couldn't serve at the altar with her younger brother.

"Women have as good a faith as men do, and I think they could deliver as good a message as men," she added.

The daughter of Joan and James Laubach, the Owego teen said she also would like to see-more of her peers become involved with the church. She said that peer pressure keeps many youths from getting involved with the church for fear of being perceived as "un-c

"They think they have to go 'in' crowd," noted Melissa. As

"Once I have something set, I follow it and that's just the way I am. They know they can't influence me in that way," said Melissa.

Father Darling affirmed Melissa's committment to her beliefs. "I think her confirmation is something she has been living out," the priest said.

He also aknowledged her talents in welcoming her peers into the church.

"She has done a lot to promote the faith without being overly religious. In natural ways she has used her talents to say, 'This is important,''' noted the Owego pastor. ''She is a witness - inside and outside of the church - of many values.


The priest added, "She does demonstrate to me a good representation of the future - in 1991 and right here in our own backyard.
