Jumpin' Jack offers hot fun

The third annual Jumpin' Jack Basketball Tournament, held July 19-21 as part of Rochester's Main Event '91, featured 700 teams, 100-degree temperatures, and a one-on-one "grudge" match between Syracuse University Basketball Coach Jim Boeheim and ESPN sportscaster Dick Vitale.

Boeheim, a star basketball player at Lyons High School and Syracuse University, easily defeated Vitale - a frequent critic of Boeheim — 15-3 in their July 19

Meanwhile, 1991 McQuaid Jesuit High School graduates Jason McKinney, Mike Montesano and Ted Naylon, along with 1991 DeSales High School graduate Bob McFadden, swept all five of their games to win their division in the men's 18-24 bracket.

The quartet played as "Lethal Weapons," a reference to the nickname given to McKinney, Montesano and Naylon after the trio led McQuaid to the Section 5 Class A crown and the state Class A semifinals last March.

Lethal Weapons was eligible to compete for the overall championship in the men's Open Division, but the competition was cancelled due to rough play by two other teams in the semifinal round.






