The campaign was established in 1970 by the U.S. bishops as an education-action program to combat domestic poverty.

CHD funds projects that enable people of all races, creeds, geographical regions and backgrounds to work together for long-range solutions to poverty in the critical areas of social and economical development, housing, health, legal aid, education and communication. CHD makes grants to groups in which those who benefit from the project have the dominant voice in planning, implementation, and policy-making for the project.

All groups interested in applying to the Campaign for Human Development are required to submit a pre-application by Nov. 1, 1991. Projects that meet the minimum criteria and guidelines will be encouraged to submit a full application by Jan. 31,


