Recently, the "retired" Father Bart O'Brien of Horseheads sent me an envelope containing three letters.

One letter was from a young man in Nigeria, asking for \$1,200 so he could study for the priesthood. He wrote that he had no money to pay the costs. Another was from the man's bishop, highly recommending the candidate. And the third was from Father O'Brien, asking if I knew anything about the seminary or the bishop. The seminary candidate had found Father O'Brien's address in a booklet circulating around Africa.

Father Jerry Aman, SJ, a graduate from McQuaid Jesuit High School, is a friend of mine. The former Webster man is serving in Nigeria as spiritual director and guide to a group of young Nigerians training for the Jesuits under his aegis. They all live at the Jesuit Community House in Ibadan, Nigeria.

I wrote to him and asked him to make inquiries about the seminary and the bishop. He promptly replied:

"I read the letter from the rector of St. Michael's Seminary to Father O'Brien, and took it over to the rector of our major seminary here in Ibadan. Both of us are suspicious, 1. We cannot find St. Michael's Seminary listed for Etiti, Nigeria. 2. The letter is not on official letter head which is rare. 3. The amount requested seems exceedingly high.

He continued, "But I have written to the Vocational director of the concerned diocese, and await his reply. I just finished a letter to Father O'Brien that he hold off until I get some response. There are needy young men here who would make fine priests. But there are also a lot of shysters. I'll keep you informed.''

Two weeks later came this reply: "I received a reply from the rector of the Minor Seminary in Okigeve. He assures me there is no such seminary as St. Michael's, and no such priest as 'Rev.' Michael Nwosu,' so the whole issue is a

"I am disappointed that Fr. O'Brien would be subjected to such a crass attempt to get money. I hope he will not let it color his view of the Nigerians. There are plenty of bad apples, here, but God also has a wonderful and abundant harvest. There are many needy and deserving people, but whoever wrote Father O'Brien is not one of them. Thanks for having the foresight to check into the whole matter."

"Joseph will not seek his revenge on us," Reuben said as he turned back to Judah. "It's not his way. It's never been Joseph's way."


But, in the end, after their father had died and the period of mourning had passed, Reuben went with his brothers and bowed low before Joseph.


