GENEVA — The New York State Education Department has selected DeSales High School to pilot the new state program known as "Principles of Engineering."

The course was designed in response to an anticipated shortage of engineers by the year 2000. State education officials hope that the program will not only encourage students to consider an engineering career, but also help them integrate the math, science and technology skills necessary to pursue engineering at the college level.

Faith and Resistance group plans retreat

PENFIELD — The Faith and Resistance Community, a Christian witness group made up of priests, religious and lay people, will present a "Pilgrimage for Life and Peace" the weekend of Oct. 25-26.

Most of the programs will take place at St. Joseph's Church, 43 Gebhardt Road.

The retreat will once again include pilgrimages to abortion and military-related facilities over the two days. Well-known peace activist Father Daniel Berrigan, SJ, John Cavanaugh-O'Keefe, founder of the Pro-Life Non-Violent Action Project, and Claire Schaeffer-Duffy, a member of the Catholic Worker in Worcester, Mass., will be the featured speakers.

The retreat will begin with an 8 a.m. Mass on Oct. 25. Registration will take place at 8:30 a.m., followed by Father Berrigan's presentation at 9 a.m. Cavanaugh-O'Keefe and Schaeffer-Duffy will offer their reflections beginning at 9:50 a.m.

Participants will then make their "pilgrimage" to an abortion or military-related facility at 11 a.m. At 5:30 p.m., retreatants will reconvene at St. Joseph Church for a light supper and prayer.

Father Berrigan, O'Cavanaugh-O'Keefe and Schaeffer-Duffy will deliver feature

presentations on "Weaving Wars Together," addressing the connection of war and abortion, at 7 p.m.

The second day will begin with a Mass at St. Joseph's Chapel at 5:30 a.m., followed by another pilgrimage to an abortion- or military-related facility. At 1 p.m., participants will then reconvene at Corpus Christi Church, 880 Main St. E., in Rochester for worship and a closing discussion on "Where Do Go from Here: Future Pilgrims."

The pilgrimage is being co-sponsored by St. Joseph's Social Ministry Committee, Corpus Christi Church, and the Pro-Life Planning Committee.

The invitation-only ceremony will be followed by a private reception and dinner.

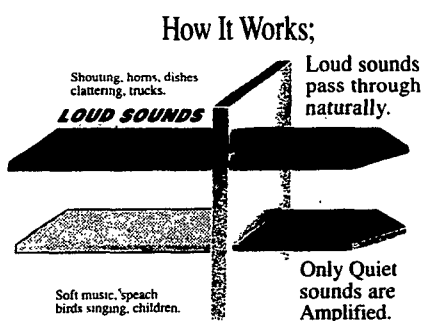
