Surprised by his opinion, I asked him: "How can you, a Baptist, deny the divinity of Christ?'


"I'm a Baptist preacher," he replied. "Every Baptist church is autonomous, and we are not pledged to a particular creed. We are free to preach as we wish."

The Catholic Church is not a collection of free-wheeling, autonomous churches, but the Body of Christ — united with the pope as the center --- in the faith as handed down throughout the ages. Before he receives Holy Communion each priest prays: "Make me faithful to your teaching, and let me never be separated from you."

Father McBrien: "There's too much power in the papacy. Popes should not name the bishops. The bishops should be appointed by the people that they are going to serve. And they should send a letter to Rome just to let them know, a courtesy before they announce it ... The pope should simply send his blessing, send a message, a telegram."

Comment: Father McBrien has been whining for years about the institutional church's slowness in implementing the documents of Vatican II.

The very first of the 16 documents, "On the Church," reads: "The college of bishops has no authority unless it is simultaneously conceived of in terms of its head, the Roman Pontiff, Peter's succes-



sor. In virtue of his office, that is as Vicar of Christ and pastor of the whole Church, the Roman Pontiff has supreme and universal power over the church, and he can always exercise this power freely." (#)22)

Pharaoh's stubbornness brings hardship upon Egypt
