

Marine Capt. Thomas P. Driscoll, McQuaid graduate

ROCHESTER — Marine Capt. Thomas P. Driscoll, a 1983 graduate of McQuaid Jesuit High School, was killed on Monday morning, Nov. 11, when his plane crashed during a training flight over Spain. He was 26.



Capt. Driscoll was flying alone in a A/V8-B Harrier jet on a low-level training flight near Villagarcia de la Torre, Spain, when his plane went down, according to Lt. Col. Marc Spurgeon of the U.S. Marine Reserve's 8th Tank Battalion, based in Chili.

Spurgeon noted that one other air-

craft was flying with Capt. Driscoll's plane at the time, and that the cause of his crash was still under investigation.

Capt. Driscoll was aboard the USS Wasp in the Mediterranean Sea. The ship is part of the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit. He was based at Cherry Point Marine Corps Air Station in Havelock, N.C., with the Marine Attack Squadron 223 detachment.

Spurgeon said that the body of Capt. Driscoll was flown home on Sunday, Nov. 17.

Father Richard P. Noonan, SJ, moderator of alumni, noted that Capt. Driscoll entered McQuaid in the eighth grade, and was known as an excellent student. In addition to competing on

the cross country and track teams, he earned membership in the National Honor Society his junior year. He also volunteered on several occasions for school functions as a member of MAGIS, the school's service club, and was a worker at BASH, McQuaid's yearly fundraiser.

"I'm really at a loss for words," Father Noonan said of Capt. Driscoll's death. "He's an excellent man, I thought, very talented in many areas, athletically, intellectually."

Saddest of all, Father Noonan added, was the fact that Capt. Driscoll was to have been married on Valentine's Day, 1992, to his fiancée, Anne D. Regan of Waterbury, Conn.

In addition to his fiancée, Capt. Driscoll is survived by his parents, John P. and Patricia (Grady) Driscoll of Brighton; a brother, Marine 1st Lt. Daniel F. Driscoll; a sister, Meghan P. Driscoll; his paternal grandmother, Lucille Driscoll Dodds; maternal grandparents Edward St. and Kathryn H. Grady; as well as several aunts, uncles and cousins.

A Mass of Christian Resurrection was scheduled for 10:30 a.m. on Wednesday, Nov. 20, at St. John of Rochester Parish in Perinton.

Dr. Florence M. Hetzler, native of Rochester, well-known professor

Dr. Florence M. Hetzler, a Rochester native and a well-known professor of philosophy, author and lecturer, died Friday, Nov. 1, 1991, at Calvary Hospital in New York City following a long illness. She was 65.

A resident of Scarsdale, N.Y., and Dablon Pointe, Cape Vincent, N.Y., Dr. Hetzler received numerous awards and honors recognizing her work in ancient philosophy and the interrela-

tionship of art and philosophy.

Until her illness, she served as professor of philosophy at Fordham University, School of General Studies. She joined the Fordham faculty in 1968. From 1951-85, Dr. Hetzler was a member of the faculty of Scarsdale Senior High School as a professor of french, latin and philosophy. On leave from the Scarsdale system in 1961-62, she was a professor of philosophy at

Canisius College in Buffalo.

Born in Rochester, Dr. Hetzler graduated magna cum laude from Marymount College, Tarrytown-on-Hudson, N.Y. in 1946. She received her master of arts degree in 1947 from L'Universite Laval, Quebec, Canada, also magna cum laude, and her doctorate of philosophy at Fordham University in 1959. She was a Fulbright Scholar at Sorbonne University in 1960.

A Mass of Christian Burial was held at Fordham University on Nov. 7. Interment was in the family plot at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

Dr. Hetzler is survived by two sisters and a brother-in-law, Rose Mary Hoysic and Carol and Dr. John Culligan; four brothers and sisters-in-law, Stephen and Eileen; Herman and Betty Jane; Joseph and Dierdre; George and Patricia Hetzler; nieces and nephews.

Sister M. Bridelia Ferguson, SSND, at 89

Sister M. Bridelia Ferguson, SSND, who taught at St. Peter and Paul School in Rochester from 1928-30, died on Monday, Oct. 28, 1991, in Lourdes Health Care Center in Wilton, Conn. She was 89 years old.

A Mass of Christian Burial for Sister Bridelia was held on Nov. 1 at the motherhouse chapel in Wilton, Conn. Interment was in St. Mary's Cemetery in Bethel, Conn.

Born in Boston, Mass., on Oct. 14, 1902, Sister Bridelia entered the School Sisters of Notre Dame from her home parish of Immaculate Conception in Malden, Mass. She was a professed member of the order for 60 years.

Sister Bridelia was as an elementary school teacher for 49 years, serving in New York, New Jersey, Connecticut, Massachusetts and Maryland. After teaching at St. Ambrose in Baltimore for one year, Sister Bridelia taught at St. Peter and Paul from 1928-30. She then moved to Mt. Carmel Parish in Camden, N.J. to teach at the parish school.

Sister Bridelia retired from teaching in 1976 and moved to the SSND motherhouse in Wilton in 1984.
