# Nazareth volunteers see different side of life

ROCHESTER — Volunteering at an inner-city children's center isn't easy work, especially when you're new at it.

Yet there are so many Nazareth Academy students who want to be a part of the school's Tutoring Program that campus minister Terry Reeder can't use them all.

"Our Nazareth students are so hungry to get out and do things in the community," said Reeder, who serves as the program's coordinator. "I have 10 (students) who come regularly, and I have to limit that group to just seniors because there are so many people who want to do this."

Each Tuesday and Thursday, and every other Wednesday, the Nazareth students spend one hour assisting with the After School Program at the Corpus Christi Center, 142 Webster Ave.

Neighborhood children, ages 2 to 11, come to the center for tutoring as well as recreational activities. The program was originated in 1983 by Corpus Christi parishioner Diana Rivaldo.

Since Nazareth became involved last year. Students come to the center in groups of three or four, spending time with 10 to 15 children.

"On the street there are liquor stores, bars and people using drugs. But it's safe in here," Reeder remarked. "And the kids love the attention. They soak it up.'

The atmosphere last Tuesday was upbeat since the children were trying out new games recently donated by Nazareth College of Rochester. A raucous version of "Twister" seemed to be the hit of the day as volunteers and children alike got into the action.

"You would call out their name and they'd see three gifts, and their eyes opened so wide," Gray recalled. "For some of the children these were the only gifts they'd get for Christmas, so they'd didn't unwrap them there. They took them home so they could open them on Christmas Day.

Moments such as these provide a heavy dose of reality for the volunteers, many of whom had never been directly exposed to poverty before joining the program.

"I've had kids cry in the car on the way home (from the Corpus Christi Center)," Reeder related. "It's hard for my students. It is a culture shock, but that's part of the objective. I think that's what part of being a Christian is. You see the face of God in the poor,
