

Catholic schools top chain's register tape drive

In a statewide drive of Wegmans Food Markets register tapes, six Catholic schools in the Rochester diocese ranked above all other participating schools.

The total value of tapes collected by students, parishioners and supporters of Our Mother of Sorrows School, 1777 Latta Road, Greece — more than \$1.1 million — was the highest in the state, according to Linda Ross, community relations specialist with Wegmans in Rochester.

After Our Mother Of Sorrows School the top five schools in the drive and the total monetary value of the tapes they collected were:

Aquinas Institute, 1127 Dewey Ave., Rochester (\$923,000); Northeastern Catholic Junior High, 125 Kings Highway S., Irondequoit (\$688,444); St. Charles Borromeo, 64 Maiden Lane, Greece (\$594,139); St.

Lawrence, 1000 N. Greece Road, Greece (\$553,798); and St. Mary's, 16 Gibson St., Canandaigua (\$519,000).

For every \$100 worth of tapes collected, a school could order \$1 worth of equipment from Pittsburgh, Pa.-based Power In Education, Inc., Ross said. Mother of Sorrows, which collected \$1,149,392 worth of tapes, will now be able to order more than \$11,493 worth of school equipment.

Ross said 944 public and private schools in Rochester, Buffalo, Syracuse, Ithaca, Binghamton and the Hornell area participated in the tape collection drive. The drive, which began Sept. 2, 1991, concluded on Nov. 30.

Thomas Bahr, principal of Our Mother of Sorrows, was elated when he found out his school ranked No. 1 in the drive.

"They really worked," he said of the students. "I'm really proud of what the

children did."

Bahr labeled the collection drive, "a whole school and parish effort." He noted that the school's head of maintenance, Robert Vogt, brought in \$39,000 worth of tapes alone.

The principal noted that his school's planned purchases include two color TV sets, two videocassette recorders, gym mats, computers and sports equipment.

Barbara Ann Homick, a spokeswoman at Aquinas, said the Dewey Avenue school purchased three computers, a microwave oven, and two softballs after its collection tapes were tallied.

St. Mary's in Canandaigua purchased three audiovisual tables; three overhead projectors; one combination videocassette recorder/20" color television; as well as a microscope, heart model, pulley set, and basketball.

Christine Pohorence, a remedial teacher's aide at St. Mary's who assisted with the tape collection program, said organizers didn't expect such dramatic results.

"We were shocked," Pohorence, said, adding that the school's goal had been \$150,000.

In addition to St. Mary's parishioners, school parents and children helped collect tapes, Pohorence said.

Nazareth College receives record \$1.2 million gift

ROCHESTER — Nazareth College, 4245 East Ave., has received a bequest estimated at \$1.2 million, the largest gift in the college's history.

The gift came from the estate of the late Rosemary A. White, who taught English at the college from 1931-67.

The college plans to invest the bequest, with the interest to be used as Miss White designated in her will. One-third of the interest will be divided between general support of the college library and the George L. White Memorial Scholarship Fund. Miss White established the fund in 1928 in memory of her father.

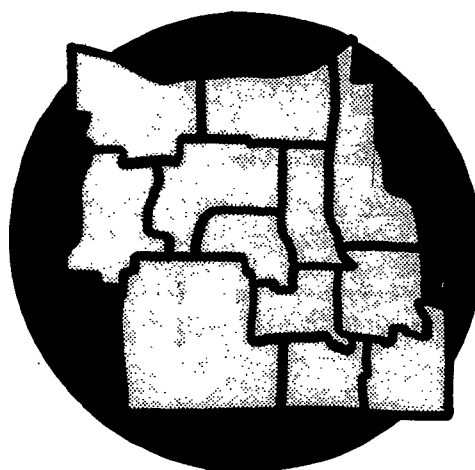
Two-thirds of the interest will be used to create an endowed professorship of English and American literature.

"Miss White made countless contributions to thousands of Nazareth students and was a valued member of our community," stated Rose Marie Beston, the college's president. "It is marvelous that she chose to express her love of the college in such a generous

and thoughtful fashion."

Miss White was also an active parishioner at St. Augustine's Church, 410 Chili Ave. After her retirement in 1967, she conducted a series of educational seminars at her home before moving to St. Ann's Home, 1500 Portland Ave., in August, 1990.

Miss White, who died on Oct. 11, 1991, is survived by a niece and three nephews.

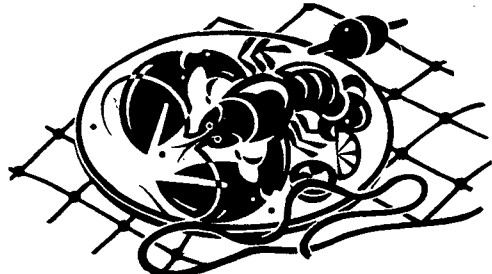
