Reader criticizes story 'promoting' organization

To the editors:

About 12 percent of the January 16th issue of the Catholic Courier was used to cover the United Way-Planned Parenthood debate. That was almost two pages of the total 16 pages. This story may have warranted a small paragraph on an inside page to give the basic facts, but the whole front page? Hardly.

As far as I know, Catholic teaching against use of artificial birth control and against having or performing an abortion has not changed. Also, as far as I know, Planned Parenthood was founded to promote artificial birth control and later expanded to include abortion as part of either its referrals or of its actual services. Therefore, the conclusion which I reach is that no newspaper with "Catholic" in its

masthead, if it is truly Catholic, can in any way even appear to promote an organization such as Planned Parenthood. A front page story in our diocesan newspaper seems to me to do just that — promote it.

Margaret Sanger created 'money machine'

or promoting Planned Parenthood.

To the editors:

As a response to your article on Planned Parenthood (Catholic Courier, Jan. 16: "Clinic project strains at seams of United Way gift umbrella"), I submit this letter.

At one time, I felt Planned Parenthood had something good to offer, excluding abortion. Some religious as well feel this way. With a little research, I have concluded that Planned Parenthood is a wolf in sheep's clothing; it makes money by playing up to the relativism of moral values. To really know what Planned Parenthood offers, one must study its history and its founder, Margaret Sanger. Today, Margaret is lauded as its champion and patron saint, giving out awards in her name.

In the '40s and '50s, with all her energy, Margaret condoned population control and abortion, convincing influential politicians to back her. She believed in hereditary improvement of a race, sharing ideas with Hitler's top scientists. In "Pivot of Civilization" she wrote, "If we must have welfare give it to the rich, not the poor." She criticized those people who gave funds for maternal care for the poor.

For years Margaret challenged longheld Judeo-Christian values. She won many unsuspecting churches to her philosophy, as well as laudable charitable organizations and the largest of corporations. But Margaret's sincerity and hard work have nothing to do with objective truth, truth that Jesus preached and claimed to be, truth valued by the Roman Catholic church.

Christian leaders as early as 90 A.D. wrote in the Didache, "do not kill a fetus by abortion." Until 1930 all denominations taught this, then Margaret started her movement. In *Grand Illusions*, George Grant described that she had created a "cult" to control population. In 1917 she wrote "more children for the fit — less for the unfit — this is the chief issue of birth control." Birth Control continues to be one of Planned Parenthood's reasons to enter our school system and our children's lives, under the guise of health care.

People who call anti-choicers "zealots" are taking sides and standing firm with Margaret Sanger, the infamous, pagan-minded, anti-Christian and founder of Planned Parenthood. For preachers of other denominations

who favor abortion let them read Matthew 25:45 where it says, "what you did not do for one of these least ones, you did not do for me."

I do not believe Margaret understood the value of objective truth, that which comes from God and is taught by the Catholic Church. Based on objective truth, Catholics have the best sex education program and the best guides to living a pure life. When I learned what the Church taught about the value of abstinence before marriage, about Natural Family Planning and the need for the sacraments to improve one's battle against temptation, I found Planned Parenthood to be a farce. Planned Parenthood is a money machine that treats the symptoms of human sexuality run amuck, yet supports the cause — more sex, "safe"

Catholics must never side with any Planned Parenthood program. These programs, started by Margaret Sanger, lack the guidance of God, and are merely precepts made by men which lead to destruction of our spiritual lives and destruction of the unborn.
