Admission fee is \$5. Call Kathy Dubel at 607/734-5893 for information.

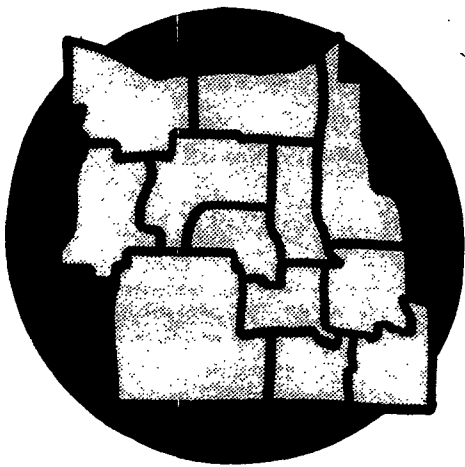
Holy Cross collects tapes, begins registration for fall

PITTSFORD — Jacob Holdt, a Dane who spent five years taking pictures of the rich and poor while hitchhiking throughout the United States, will present his multi-media show at St. John Fisher College on Feb. 25.

Entitled "American Pictures," the presentation will take place in the college's Basil auditorium, 3690 East Ave.

Selling his blood plasma twice a week to purchase a film, Holdt lived in more than 400 homes. His journey took him

from poor sharecropper shacks in the South to the mansions of America's wealthiest families. In addition to infiltrating Ku Klux Klan meetings, Holdt worked in prison camps and watched criminals at work.

One of the presentation's aims is to reveal racism's psychological costs on both blacks and whites.

Diocese accepting applications for grants

ROCHESTER — Groups working to alleviate domestic poverty are invited to apply to the Rochester diocese for 1992 Campaign for Human Development grants.

Proposals are being sought for projects that address the basic causes of poverty and work to change unjust social structures. Requests for CHD grants of up to \$10,000 will be considered for low-income, self-help groups attempting to develop economic and/or social self-determination in their communities.

Organizations seeking funding must submit a pre-application by March 12, 1992. Groups submitting proposals meeting the minimum criteria will then be asked to submit a full application by May 1. CHD grants are awarded each September.
