Cardinal praises Engaged Encounter's work

OMAHA, Neb. — Married couples involved in the Catholic Engaged Encounter movement deserve praise for their "dedicated work for the dignity of love and marriage," said Cardinal Alfonso Lopez Trujillo.

Cardinal Lopez Trujillo, president of the Vatican's Pontifical Council for the Family, took part in the Catholic Engaged Encounter national convention in Omaha in October, 1991. The convention drew more than 600 people from the United States and 14 other coun-

The Colombian cardinal said Pope John Paul II "is very appreciative of the service given by married couples who are helping to prepare couples for the sacrament of matrimony.'

"It's wonderful how these married couples share their experiences with engaged couples," he said. "Their example of love and fidelity is important to see for people preparing for marriage."

Cardinal Lopez Trujillo presented the convention with a letter from Cardinal Angelo Sodano, Vatican secrétary of state, in which the pope encouraged Engaged Encounter members "to share joyfully with others the



fruits of God's grace in their lives" in order to "lead young people to appreciate ever more fully the lofty place of marriage and the family in God's plan for the salvation of mankind."

At a Mass opening the second day of the convention, banners from the Engaged Encounter communities were displayed. One of the banners proclaimed: "A wedding is a day ... A marriage is a lifetime.

Omaha Archbishop Daniel E. Sheehan, principal celebrant of the Mass,

discussed how many married couples are finding a lifetime commitment difficult in today's world, with nearly half of the marriages in this country ending in divorce.

The Prideauxs, who celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary Jan. 1, 1992, have six children, 13 grandchildren and five greatgrandchildren and have been involved in Engaged Encounter about four years.

"We feel we can share our experiences from our first year of marriage all the way through to our 50th year," Eunice Prideaux said. "Helping these young couples keeps us young and helps our marriage to grow even stronger."

One of the keys to a successful marriage, she said, is communication. Young couples need to learn the importance of communication because good communication can avoid a lot of


misunderstandings," she said. Edward and Dorothy Pisarski of Staten Island, said their first contact with Engaged Encounter was eight years ago prior to their marriage.


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
