## Irish hammer Greece, protect hockey crown

ROCHESTER — It's easy to see that Aquinas Institute and Greece are the class of Section 5 hockey, but it's been much more difficult to determine which team deserves the right to be called No. 1.

That is, until last week

The Little Irish, fueled by a five-goal run that began late in the second period and broke a 1-1 tie, came away with a 7-3 victory over Greece on Feb. \$\alpha\$13 at Lakeshore Rinks.

The big win, combined with a 5-1 decision over McQuaid Jesuit two days later at Genesee Valley Park, gave the Little Irish their second consecutive Monroe County Division 1 championship. AQ completed the regular season with a 16-2 league record (18-2 overall), while Greece had to settle for second place after leading the division most of the season.

AQ also took the regular-season ser-

ies from the Lightning. Greece, the defending Section 5 Class A champion, won 5-4 in overtime on Jan. 4 before the Irish came back for a 5-4 decision on Jan. 25.

Since those games were so close, as was the first half of the Feb. 13 meeting, AQ's decisive scoring flurry was a real shocker.

Greece had taken the early lead on a goal by Todd Yates 4:49 into the first period before Aquinas' Chris Sichak knotted the score just more than a minute later.

That was the extent of the scoring until Grady Monks got AQ rolling with 4:10 left in the second period. The Irish got a big lift when Jeremy Giordano won a faceoff with :03 left and slid a pass in the slot to Chris Schultz, who scored just as time ran out to make it 3-1.

AQ kept pouring it on after intermission. Giordano scored just 56 seconds into the third period, and the lead swelled to 6-1 on goals by Joe

Zabawa at 6:31 and Monks at 7:06.

"Greece started taking chances when they got behind, and that opened it up a little for us," said AQ Coach Dave Montgomery.

"I don't know what happened; something got into us," Monks added. "We all wanted to win so bad."

Greece finally got back on the board when Jason Bonsignore scored at the 7:54 mark, but Schultz picked up his second goal at 10:07. Greece's Fred Hilton closed out the scoring with :04 left.

AQ was outshot 32-27 for the game, but Little Irish goalie Brian Kelly made several spectacular saves.

The Irish, ranked fifth in the state last week, are the No. 1 seed for the five-team sectional Class A playoffs. Aquinas will be back in action next Wednesday, Feb. 26, with a semifinal game against either No. 4 Irondequoit or No. 5 Batavia.

Game time is scheduled for 7 p.m. at Genesee Valley, with the winner of that game advancing to the Feb. 29 finals at the State University of New York College at Brockport.

Despite losing 6-3 to Greece on Feb. 11 and then to Aquinas four days later, McQuaid has still locked up the No. 3 sectional seed with a 10-7 record. The

Knights will face No. 2 Greece next Tuesday, Feb. 25, at 7 p.m. at Lake-shore.

Coach Al Vyverberg feels his club is capable of knocking off Greece. "We've got to play physical, keep

the pace up and score on our opportunities. We haven't done that with them or Aquinas this year," Vyverberg remarked.

Bishop Kearney ended its regular season in style with a 6-3 win over Fairport on Feb. 15 at Thomas Creek Ice Arena. That victory, which improved the Kings to 6-12, followed an 11-5 loss to Pittsford on Feb. 12 at Lakeshore.

BK was scheduled to play its opening sectional Class B playoff game on Feb. 19. The Class B tournament combines schools from Divisions 2 and 3.

The offense was sparked by Dan Flanigen's two goals and one assist. BK built its lead to 6-1 midway through the third period over the Red Raiders, who were in second place in Division 2 and had beaten Greece earlier this season.

"The kids played extremely well defensively. We came to play," said Coach Rob Liberatore.

Seymour, along with Tim Steed (105), Chris Kamas (112) and Mike Clune (167), earned No. 1 seeds for the Section 4 Class D championships, scheduled for Feb. 22 at Deposit High School.

Bishop Kearney wrestler Gracen Porreca, a 112-pounder, recorded a pin to improve his season record to 23-1-1 during a 54-16 home loss to Greece Olympia on Feb. 15.

Boys' bowling saw a big performance by Aquinas on Feb. 11 at North Park. The Little Irish threw a 1,025 game, the league's best this year, in a 3-0 victory over McQuaid.
