Parish to host Living Stations performance

AUBURN — The Living Stations of the Cross will be performed at St. Mary's Parish, 15 Clark St., on April 2.

The 7:30 p.m. performance will be presented by the Watertown, N.Y.-based Immaculate Heart Central High School Mystery Players. In addition to high school seniors, the group — which was established in 1981 — includes several adults.

Father Patrick Sullivan, parochial vicar at St. Mary's, arranged the group's visit to Auburn. He learned about the players through an Auburn resident related to the group's director.

"We heard they were coming though the area," Father Sullivan said, "and we decided to get them." During Lent, the group, which performs religious plays throughout New York state and New Jersey each year, concentrates on the Way of the Cross—the Living Stations. According to school officials, the troupe performs

the Stations 15-20 times each year.

After presenting the Stations in Auburn, the players will travel to Buffalo for a performance the following night.

Father Sullivan noted that the Stations will include special lighting and music as well as incorporate pantomime and paraliturgical readings. The performance is not a play, but rather a meditation on Jesus' life, according to Father Sullivan.


