# Student summit strives to halt hunger

BRIGHTON — The numbers are sobering: more than 35,000 people die each day from hunger or hungerrelated causes.

Among that staggering number of people, more than 75 percent are under the age of 5.

Being aware of these statistics wasn't enough for some Rochesterarea high schoolers. They wanted to do something to alleviate the problem.

Approximately 80 youths gathered Saturday, March 28, for the first-ever Rochester Area Youth Ending Hunger Conference held at The Harley School, 1981 Clover St.

A series of films, workshops, discussions and guest speakers filled the morning and afternoon. Former Congressman Barber Conable, who was also president of the World Bank, was the keynote speaker.

Beth Cooper Benjamin, a 17-year-old Harley junior and one of the program's organizers, noted that the activities she helped plan were two-fold in purpose: to inform, and to initiate action.

"The most important thing is education. If people are willing to be educated, then we can beat this problem," said Benjamin. "We also wanted to develop a community-wide Youth Ending Hunger group that will help the homeless, have forums with the community and media, and give presentations in schools. The idea was for these people (students) to continue to work together after the conference. I expect to see most of them again."

April Brooks, 15, a ninth-grader at Our Lady of Mercy High School, attended the conference along with fellow Mercy freshmen Lindsay Columbo and Lisa Lesniak. Brooks found one workshop to be particularly moving.

"My workshop was about welfare, and it was actually given by two people who are on welfare. I learned a lot, about the number of welfare people and how difficult it is for them. I didn't want to each lunch that day, I felt so bad," Brooks remarked.

Frank Cavallaro, 17, was one of four Aquinas Institute seniors to participate. He noted that his group, which

also includes Jennifer Cianciola, Tony Maiola and Jeanne Schickler, will make a presentation on hunger to other AQ students in the near future.

"We need to let students know about hunger and how much it would cost to end it," said Cavallaro. "A lot of people have to participate, not just one little group."

The Harley conference was modeled after similar Youth Ending Hunger Conferences in nearby cities. Benjamin said that she and the event's other organizer, 17-year-old Harley senior Jen Rubenstein, got the idea for sponsoring a local event after they both spoke at a conference in Toronto last fall.

They and four other Harley students had also participated in the national Youth Ending Hunger Summit in Buffalo last August.

Youth Ending Hunger is a 25,000-member international organization of young people whose goal is to educate communities and spur them toward ending world hunger.

'Hunger is so unnecessary. It's absolutely ludicrous that we haven't stopped it already. It's got to be our first goal," Benjamin emphasized.

### Elmira native, astronaut set to land at Notre Dame High


