Kings are cruising

Bishop Kearney was especially impressive last week, winning three games in as many days: 20-1 over visiting Northstar Christian Academy on April 13; 19-5 over visiting Mercy on April 14 in the league opener for both schools; and 27-5 over host Marshall on April 15.

"We have a lot of good hitting and a great defense," said junior varsity Coach Noelle Feeney, who is running the team this week with third-year head coach Paul Forte out of town.

First it was Bishop Kearney; then five years ago, along came McQuaid Jesuit.

And within the next couple of years, Aquinas Institute and Elmira Notre Dame will become the third and fourth diocesan high schools to field varsity lacrosse programs.

Aquinas' junior-varsity team is now in its second year, and the school plans to go varsity next season. Already, the Little Irish are showing signs of developing into a quality program; they've begun their season with three consecutive victories after finishing with a 3-8 record a year ago.

AQ has won by convincing margins in all three games: 8-2 over visiting Newark on April 7; 9-2 over visiting McQuaid on April 9; and 13-5 at Newark on April 13. As far as Coach Chris Welch is concerned, the team is better off playing two seasons of JV before jumping to the varsity level.

"We didn't want to take brand-new kids and have them playing varsity, because it's difficult enough to play JVs," Welch commented.

Top players have been attackmen Doug Crowley and Joe Zabawa, midfielder Brian Callahan and defenseman Jon Martins.

The first-year JV team at Elmira Notre Dame, meanwhile, has scored only one goal in two games, but still came extremely close to gaining a victory.

The Crusaders lost 9-0 at home to Maine-Endwell in their inaugural game on April 6, then incurred a 2-1 loss in double overtime to visiting Johnson City April 13.

According to Coach Kevin Hogan, Notre Dame elected to begin a lacrosse program because of the sport's tremendous popularity in the Southern Tier.
