## All do not enter the city of God

Sunday's Readings: (R3) John 14:23-29; (R1) Acts 15:1-2, 22-29; (R2) Revelation 21:10-14, 22-23.

The second reading's passage from Revelation is a beautiful image of a city that has no need of sun or moon, for the glory of God is its light and the Lamb is its lamp.

Light was the first thing God created. Aside from moles, earthworms, and criminals, living things are attracted to light. Light turns us on. The Psalmist says, "The Lord is my light." Jesus called Himself "the light of the world."

God shines on people for their own good. He enlightens their minds, cares for them, and lights up their way. Jesus was the light, says John, who shone in the darkness, illuminating the way to salvation. We are to walk by that light.

The vision of the city of God was shown to John so that he might tell Christians about it, so that they might patiently endure the trials and persecutions under the cruel Domitian. It was a city of scintillating beauty, secure behind massive walls, vast enough to encompass peoples of all nations, races, and tongues — a city of eternal joy. Therefore, a city worth every trial and tribulation to live.


The most important thing in life is not to get into the country club, Harvard, Congress, or even the White House. The most important thing is to get into the city of God. This is not as easy as one might think. Of course, it is no trouble getting into church, but that is not the equivalent of getting into the city of God. "Not everyone who says to me 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of Heaven." And yet the most important thing in the world is to get into the city of God.

In the same passage, John says, "Nothing unclean will enter it, nor any(one) who does abominable things or tells lies. Only those will enter whose names are written in the Lamb's book of life" (Rv. 21:27).

Three categories of people are prohibited from entering the holy city. First, the unclean or profane, the secularist and materialist in contrast to the God-fearing and God-serving.

Second, those who commit abominations, who defile themselves the temples of God — by loathsome sins of impurity: masturbation, contraception, abortion, homosexuality.


And lastly, the liars, not those who simply tell lies, but those who live a lie, the hypocrites — vice par-




## ading as virtue.
