Most people love photographs. At least it seems so to me, especially at this time of the year. That may be because I've celebrated so many confirmations in recent weeks and have participated in a variety of celebrations that have meant a great deal to people.

I have often thought that had George Eastman been born before our Lord, Jesus would have carried some pictures with him as complements to the wonderful wordpictures and stories he used when he wanted to speak to the hearts of those who wal-

Every now and then I take a moment, in my room or my office, to look carefully at the photos I have hanging in those places. And occasionally at home, I take out a photo album and rest with the memories and feelings that emerge and I move slowly through its pages.

But such moments touch not only the past. I never spend time with those old photos without coming out of the experience more alert to all that is life-giving in today's relationships and activities.
