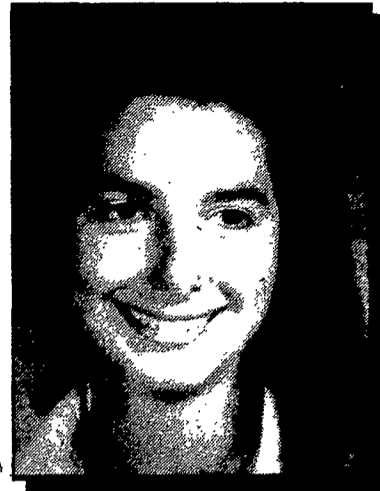

Newspaper backs Catholic school scholarship campaign

MIAMI — The Miami Herald, a major U.S. daily newspaper, has thrown its support behind efforts to save an inner-city parochial school slated to close in June.

David Lawrence Jr., the newspaper's publisher, announced the paper's support April 26 and called for donations to a scholarship program to keep St. Francis Xavier School open.

The school, which was founded in 1935, is the black community's oldest parochial school. It enrolls 78 students from kindergarten through eighth grade.

Cost of an annual scholarship is \$1,200, and families of pupils still will be expected to pay according to need, Lawrence said.

Each contribution will be earmarked for a specific child and at year's end the donor will receive a report on the child's progress. If \$96,000 is raised the school can remain in operation for one year, Lawrence said.

St. Francis Xavier School serves the predominantly African-American community in the Overtown section near downtown Miami, where civil and racial unrest made headlines in the 1980s. Most of its pupils are not Catholic.

Lawrence, who appealed for donations in his weekly column, said Overtown had stalwart people who paid heavily for urban development.

"This is a community that has been home to black people since Miami's earliest days," he said. "In decades

past, the zeal to build highways sliced up Overtown imperiling any sense of neighborhood. Those who lived there had no clout to stop what the powerful called 'progress.'"

Its slogan is "Not just one school and not just one year," Heffernan told CNS. "It's the beginning of real involvement

with inner-city parochial schools."

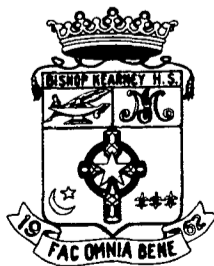

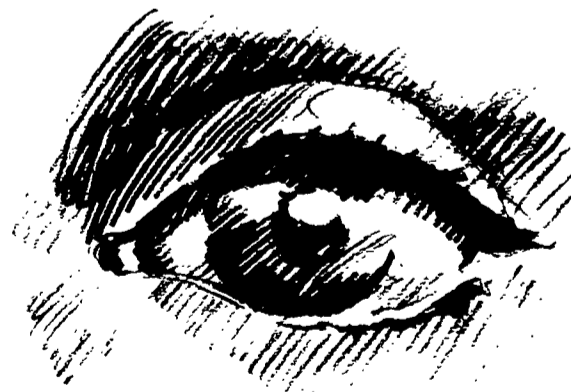
