Our plenary session begins on Thursday morning and extends until Saturday. One more committee meeting will keep me there until my return flight late Monday evening.



One feature of our spring meetings has been an opportunity to spend a day of prayer with the bishops. We'll devote Sunday to that. I very much look forward to the peace of that day.

Before heading to our meeting at Notre Dame, I want to thank all of you in our parishes who have devoted so much time and energy to helping our candidates prepare for the sacrament of confirmation. Your generous commitment of time and energy, the quiet witness of your faith are precious gifts not only to our candidates, but also to everyone in our community of faith.

I finished my round of confirmations on Sunday at St. Andrew's Parish, Rochester. It was a warm, sunny day on which the parish community gathered in obvious support and affection for the candidates. The music and participation were especially good.


Another enriching feature of the day was the fact that we had candidates from Holy Rosary and Annunciation in Rochester, and from St. Stephen's in Geneva.
