
Notwithstanding the adjustments we all experience returning from vacation, I am very happy to be back. And I am filled with excitement about the events that lie before us in the months ahead.

The centerpiece of those events, of course, is our Diocesan Synod. At the top of my reading material when I returned was the booklet prepared for our parish synods scheduled for the last two weeks of September and the first week of October.

The booklet contains articles designed to stimulate discussion of and recommendations about our first three synodal themes. It also contains appropriate prayer services, and helpful annotation to stimulate the reader and promote discussion.

I found it exciting to review the material once again. That's because now that the booklet is printed, it's an easy step to imagine the faith, creativity and imagination that you and our sisters and brothers all over our diocese will bring to this process.

The articles in the booklet provide a beginning stimulus, an initial common ground. I am confident that what is begun at our parish synods in the fall will grow and deep-



en in wonderful ways by the time we experience our full diocesan Synod in the first days of October, 1993.

The ultimate source of my confidence, however, is not so much in the rich gifts and talents we possess. My confidence rests rather in the fidelity of the Lord and His promise to be with us always. If we gather in faith, we can be sure that the Lord's Holy Spirit will strengthen and guide us in our deliberations. Whenever that happens the life of the community inevitably grows, sometimes in ways beyond our imagining.

As I write this Monday, I think of the Gospel of today's eucharistic liturgy — the Lord feeds the multitude with the few loaves and fishes available among them. If all of us enter our synodal experience willing both to offer what we have and to receive the gifts of others, we will be richly fed by the Lord who loves us all.

In anticipation of this extraordinary moment in the history of our local church let me invite you to the following:

1). Pray for the wisdom and guidance of the Holy Spirit for all of us during our Synod.

2). Participate in the process as much as the circumstances of your life allow you to.

3). Encourage others to participate — especially those who are not active in our community or who, for whatever reason, feel estranged from or hurt by us.

4). Have confidence that you have something to offer to our community and that our sisters and brothers have good things to offer you.

5). Remember that the Synod is not primarily a political process, but an expression of faith; that my goal is not to push my agenda but with the community to discover what God wants for us all.

6. Keep the following questions in your prayers and thoughts during the coming weeks:

- What could we as a church be doing better?
- How can we carry on Jesus' mission more effectively?
- Where is the best place to use our limited resources?

Thanks, once again, for your kind consideration.
