Police probe break-in at St. Mary's

Fire at Auburn church caused minor damage

AUBURN - Auburn police are continuing their investigation of a July 18 break-in and fire at St. Mary's rectory, 15 Clark St.

In addition to fire and smoke damage in the kitchen — where police say the fire was set - smoke and property damage occurred throughout

The parish is still receiving bills for cleaning, repair and replacement costs, according to Father Robert J. Schrader, St. Mary's pastor. The priest added that he was unable to estimate the total damage until all bills are received, and that nothing appeared to be stolen.

According to Father Schrader, a person broke though a window in the walkway connecting the rectory and the church shortly before 2 a.m. July 18. The perpetrator apparently cut himself and consequently left a trail of blood, the priest said.

A witness told Auburn police that he had seen a man with a mediumbuild, dressed in blue jeans and a combat-fatigue jacket, smashing the window.

After setting the kitchen fire and causing damage in another room, the intruder then fled through the rectory's front door by breaking a chain lock on the door and waking Father Schrader, the pastor reported.


In addition to fire damage to the kitchen wall and floor, sections of the rectory's carpeting and wallpaper were also damaged and will need replacement, Father Schrader said.

Carpets and drapes in other parts of the rectory had to be cleaned and the kitchen wall and ceiling will have to be repainted due to fire and smoke damage. In addition, the front door and broken window also needed repair, the pastor said.

Auburn Police Detective Michael Pitcher declined to discuss the case in detail. "I have suspects. I do hope to make arrests," he said.

The detective did acknowledge that among those suspects were three Auburn men arrested in Ithaca July 24 in connection with a series of burglaries in Tompkins and Cayuga counties.
