## Gates church hosts colorful synod

GATES — For parishioners of Holy Ghost Church, 220 Coldwater Road, the diocesan Synod is not a process that should be limited to meetings and

Special synod-related ceremonies and decorations during weekend Masses have greatly enhanced the event for parishioners at the Gates church, according to Elizabeth Reinholtz.

"We're trying to make this a celebration and to draw attention to the Synod. The main thing is that we want to get involvement," said Reinholtz, chairperson of the parish's Liturgy Committee. "I know we got people's

The period for parish fall synods runs from Sept. 20 to Oct. 10. Holy Ghost, which celebrated special synod Masses Sept. 20 and 27, will conclude its current celebration this Sunday, Oct. 4. All weekend Masses feature a procession in which teenagers carry a synod banner and small children ring bells while singing "Come and Rejoice."

At the 11:30 a.m. Sunday Mass, the choir will sing downstairs instead of its traditional spot in the loft. At the 11:30 a.m. liturgy, as well as some other Masses (8:15 and 9:30 a.m. on Sundays and 5:15 p.m. on Saturdays), a brass quartet will accompany the processions.' Musical arrangements during Holy Ghost's fall synod were prepared by Lori Osgood, the parish's music coordinator.

Various colors - highlighted on altar cloths, streamers and floral arrangements — have reflected the synod's theme for each week: pink, to symbolize bravery and courage in relation to family life; blue, to reflect sincerity and piety in relation to parish life; and green, to symbolize youth and hope in relation to those facing violence and

Reinholtz noted that white bows and candles were used throughout the three-week period to signify the community's faith.

'We've been real successful. A lot of people have said how colorful everything is," said Reinholtz.

Holy Ghost is one of 170 parishes and communities within the Rochester diocese, all of which are participating in the Synod. This is the first Synod to be held in Rochester since 1954, and the first-ever which includes parishioners' input on various committees.

The process is scheduled to conclude in October of 1993.

#### Annual 'life chains' slated throughout diocese Oct. 4

To commemorate Respect Life Sunday, pro-life activists from around the diocese will take part in "life chains" this Sunday, Oct. 4.

The annual chains are scheduled to take place in Brockport, Geneva, Hornell and Rochester. During the demonstrations, participants will silently line road sides for one hour. Most demonstrators will carry signs exclaiming "Abortion Kills Children." Activists will use other signs, including placards that say "Christ Heals and Forgives" and "Adoption, the Loving Option."

According to organizers, the goal of the chains is to draw attention to abortion. Statistics show that 1.5 million abortions are performed in the United States each year.

The chains in the diocese will be held in conjunction with chains in communities across the United States.

Approximately 3,700 participants took part in the four life chains in the Rochester diocese last year. More than 600,000 people last year took part in more than 350 chains throughout the United States and Canada.

The Rochester chain will stretch along East Avenue from 2-3 p.m.

The chain in Brockport will form a cross along Routes 19 and 31 from 2:30-3:30 p.m. Participants are asked to arrive at 4590 Lake Road at 2 p.m. to receive their assigned spots along the chạin.

The Hornell chain will also form a cross — along Route 36 and Main Street - from 2:30-3:30 p.m. Participants are asked to meet at 2 p.m. at the Burger King on Main Street.

The Geneva chain will stretch along Geneva's Lakeshore Drive from 2:30-3:30 p.m.
