'Expert' decries silence on abuse

To the editors:

I am writing in reference to the article in the September 17 edition of the Courier ("Study: Trust in clergy on decline"). I am writing as somewhat of an expert on the issue of child sexual abuse.

I did not gain most of my expertise from a book; I learned it through my own personal experience of being sexually abused as a child. I was not abused by a priest, but just being a priest does not excuse the terrible ordeal any child is put through when he/she is abused.

If there has been a lack of trust in the clergy over the issue, I would dare to say that the reason behind this is the fact that the Church has done nothing to show they want to help the children of sexual abuse. Giving the child and his/her family money to keep quiet about the abuse is not helping the child in any way. It is, however, helping both the priest and the Church keep up the act that nothing wrong has been done.

As a survivor of childhood sexual abuse, I can speak from experience on the issue. For many years I had repressed all memory of my abuse. I have discovered that this is very common in incest/sexual abuse victims.

Part of the reasoning for this is for our own sanity, and part of it comes from the many threats that are used in most cases of child abuse. I can't even imagine the kinds of threats a priest could use against an innocent child. After all, this is the person the child has been taught to always listen to, to respect, etc. Can you even possibly begin to understand the damage done to a child by suffering this most ultimate form of abuse from someone of such a high and respected standing, someone who the child knows will almost always be believed over him/her, even in many cases by the child's own family.

Now you have a child who not only has been violated in the most horrible manner by someone who certainly



knows better, someone who, by getting away with his/her sick behavior, knows he can continue with either this same child or other ones, but you also have a child who is now threatened either directly or indirectly, to keep his/her mouth shut, or something worse might just happen to him/her or to their loved ones. What do you think this child is going to do in most cases?

You've got it. He/she is going to be abused again in the form of living in constant fear that something he/she says might result in something else happening. What that might be, he/she doesn't even want to think about. It's easier, in the child's mind, to just forget

everything that has been done to him/her. Of course, he/she can't control the feeling that will persist as a result of the abuse, and the memories will be in hiding too.

This once innocent child will now grow up believing he/she must have been a pretty bad child to have something so bad have happened to them. He/she will most always have a low self-esteem, will constantly try to please people, will constantly strive to be the best at everything, will never feel worthy of any compliments, will never feel worth any one else's attention, and will almost always be willing to protect others from any perceived hurt or danger. Most of the prostitutes of the world were victims of incest/sexual abuse, and because they think so little of themselves, they let others do almost anything they want to them.

This is just a tiny picture of what a child who has suffered any form of sexual abuse goes through, and what does a priest who has abused any of them go through? NOT MUCH! In most cases he will simply be transferred to another parish, but of course, no word of his actions will be sent to the new parish. What does anyone care about all the new, once innocent, children just ripe for his picking?

Something has to be done to stop this rampant abuse of our children. This includes stopping all child molesters: parents, stepparents, boyfriends/girlfriends of a parent, siblings, grandparents, neighbors, aunts, uncles, cousins, teachers, doctors, and PRIESTS. When is the Church going to be willing to get its head out of the sand and start helping the victims of childhood sexual abuse instead of the perpetrators?

I am a member of the Corning/Painted Post Cluster of Churches, and I am also the facilitator of an Incest Survivors Support Group for Women in Corning. In Elmira recently, another group for women has begun, and there has now been a group formed for male victims of childhood sexual abuse/incest. Wouldn't it be a wonderful world if we didn't need these groups anyplace? Until we all start doing something to end this terrible crime committed against the innocent children of our world, that day is going to be a long way off.
