The volunteer translates synod documents and materials into Spanish for Hispanic members of the diocese. May usually works from 10 a.m. to 2 or 3 p.m. Monday through Friday.

A parishioner of St. Paul's Church in Webster, May has been translating material for the synod office since August, 1991.

"It was my way of thanking God for his blessings" May said, "and an opportunity to help the progress and development of the church."

May volunteered her translating services after hearing Synod Director Father Joseph Hart, who lives at St. Paul's Church, ask for help with the Synod during Mass.

May said at first she thought she could help with the clerical work. But after Father Hart asked her to translate a paper into Spanish for him, he was so pleased with the result that he asked her to join with Lourdes DeChateauviex — a secretary in diocesan Urban Services — in producing translations for the Synod.

Actually, May has had experience with translating prior to her synod work. A native of Mexico, she was a bilingual secretary and coordinator of communications for a Japanese company in Mexico City.

May came to Rochester after marrying her husband, Ward, in 1986. The couple met in a Mexico City coffee shop.

"He asked me to pass the sugar," she said, adding with a laugh, "I'm glad he's not diabetic."

Since agreeing to help the synod office, May has been busy translating letters, leadership manuals and synod newsletters. Approximately 1,000 copies of each translated document are produced. She is currently translating themes that will be used in parish synod discussions scheduled for Fe-

bruary and April, 1993.

May said she has enjoyed the work because of the people she has met along the way.

"The warmth and the friendship here has been plenty," she said. "Every day, it's like a new, beautiful day for me when I come here."




May will be back in the spring, however, to continue her work, which she expects to continue until after the General Synod in October, 1993.

Polish bishop visits **Rochester and Hilton**

HILTON - Bishop Joseph Zycinski finds himself in a situation many bishops would envy.

The 44-year-old bishop of Tarnow, Poland has ordained 175 men to the priesthood - both diocesan and religious - in the past two years. In addition, he will ordain 55 more diocesan seminarians in the coming year.

"The south of Poland is very Catholic," Bishop Zycinski observed. "The people have faith, they have conviction, they have a hierarchy of values.

"For me, it is quite a new experience," the former college professor added.

Bishop Zycinski was in Rochester from Oct. 28-31 for minor surgery. He left for Washington, D.C. on Oct. 31 to meet with officials of Catholic News Service for advice and suggestions about developing the Catholic press in Poland.

While in Rochester, Bishop Zycinski stayed with his doctor, Sandy Sorrentino, and his wife, Maria, part of the time. He also stayed with Father Chester Klocek, pastor of St. Leo's Parish in Hilton. The polish bishop met the pastor in Poland during one of the diocesan priest's recent visits.

In addition to enjoying a wealth of new priests and seminarians during his first two years as bishop of Tarnow, Bishop Zycinski has created a lay theological institute with a healthy enrollment of 250 students.

"In five years," he predicted, "many will have master's degrees in theology."
