Aquinas teams advance to soccer semifinals

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Thanks to quarterfinal wins, Aquinas Institute took one step closer toward cashing in on a great two-forone deal: a pair of Section 5 soccer titles in the same year.

The AQ boys, seeded No. 1 in the sectional Class BB playoffs, won 3-0 over ninth-seeded Irondequoit in a game played last Thursday, Oct. 29, at Spencerport High School. That triumph put Aquinas into a semifinal contest against No. 5 Brighton, scheduled for Nov. 3.

Meanwhile, the Aquinas girls' soccer team, seeded No. 2 in Class A, advanced with a 2-1 home win over seventhseeded Rush-Henrietta on Oct. 30. AQ earned a Nov. 3 semifinal matchup against its Private-Parochial League arch-rival, Our Lady of Mercy. The winner of that game will play in the title game this Saturday, Nov. 7.

Mercy, seeded No. 3 and the defending champion in Section 5 Class A, won 2-0 over No. 6 Gates-Chili in a game played on Oct. 30 at Bishop Kearney.

The Elmira Notre Dame girls' soccer team also advanced to the semifinals. ND survived a first-round scare in the Section 4 Class D playoffs, winning 2-1 in sudden-death overtime over 16th-seeded Charlotte Valley on Oct. 28 at Conklin. The No. 1-seeded Crusaders then recorded a 4-0 win over No. 9 South New Berlin on Oct. 31 at Susquehenna Valley. The two victories sent ND into a semifinal game against No. 5 Stamford, which was scheduled for Nov. 4.


Back in Section 5, four other squads from Catholic high schools in the diocese were eliminated from sectional soccer play last week.

McQuaid Jesuit High School was the victim of an upset, losing 2-0 to Webster in an Oct. 28 quarterfinal game at Wayne. The Knights were seeded No. 4 in Section 5 Class A, and Webster was No. 5.

The Nazareth Academy girls, seeded No. 4 in Section 5 Class CC, were bumped by host and No. 5 seed Byron-Bergen, 3-2, in quarterfinal action on Oct. 30.

Bishop Kearney's girls, seeded No. 7 in Section 5 Class B, won 1-0 over host and 10th-seeded Honeoye Falls-Lima in an Oct. 28 first-round game. The Kings were eliminated on Oct. 31 by host and second-seeded Wellsville, 2-0.

Finally, the Notre Dame boys, seeded ninth in Section 4 Class D, lost 4-1 in overtime to No. 8 Roxbury in first-round action on Oct. 27 at Franklin, N.Y.

ND rolls to eighth straight victory; McQuaid offense buries Wilson

The regular season is over, and the Elmira Notre Dame football team still doesn't know what it's like to face a late-game pressure situation.

ND, ranked 12th in last week's state Class C-D poll, hiked its record to 8-0 with a 41-6 home win over Watkins Glen last Friday evening, Oct. 30. That victory gave the Crusaders their first perfect regular season in the school's 34-year history. By defeating Watkins Glen, ND also won the Section 4 Division 5 championship with a 4-0 league record. The Crusaders now move on to the sectional playoffs, facing Division 7 champ Tioga this Saturday, Nov. 7, at 2 p.m. The game will be played at Tioga. "The kids have really matured. I just hope we can continue the roll we're on," remarked Coach Mike D'Aloisio. McQuaid Jesuit also had a productive weekend, rolling to a 40-14 win over Wilson in a City-Catholic League game played on Oct. 31. The Knights improved their record to 5-3 while winning their third consecutive game. In another City-Catholic League contest from Oct. 31, Aquinas Institute wound up on the short end of a 26-13 decision against host Marshall. The Little Irish's record tumbled to 2-6 with the loss.

Kearney and Geneva DeSales, which each faltered in Finger Lakes League action over the weekend. Kearney (0-7-1) fell to host Geneva, 17-6, on Oct. 30; and DeSales (0-7) was downed by visiting South Seneca, 24-0, on Oct. 31. . . .

Notre Dame jumped out to an early 6-0 lead over Watkins Glen on Joel Stephens' one-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. After the Senecas tied the score at 6-6 early in the second quarter, the Crusaders added two TDs for a 21-6 halftime edge: Jon Sutterby and Shaun Bennett hooked up on an 81-yard pass play, and Sutterby then threw four yards to Pat Palmer. ND tacked on three additional touchdowns in the second half: Luke Sheehan to Pat Palmer on a 37-yard flea-flicker pass play; Marc Della Sala on a four-yard run; and Dan Wilson on a six-yard run. The Crusaders head into the playoffs having outscored their regular-season opposition by a 248-43 margin. . . . McQuaid scored two of its first three TDs through the air to take a 21-6 halftime lead over Wilson. Kelly Scanlon hit Jamie DeLuca for 25 yards, and, after a one-yard scoring run by Jim Malvaso, Scanlon connected with Ben Wandtke on a 12-yard TD. The Knights added three second-half touchdown runs: Ben DeLuca, from three yards; John Pineau, from 12; and Brad Mitchell, from 30.

The Notre Dame boys forced overtime in their Section 4 game against Roxbury on Alberto Martinez's second-half goal. The Crusaders then surrendered three goals in OT and ended the season at 5-11.

Mercy, the defending champion, recorded a three-game sweep of Wilson Magnet in its quarterfinal battle, also held on Oct. 31 at Edison.
