Samaria — A local man, known only as Caleb, claims to have been healed instantly of his leprosy yesterday.

According to Caleb, the spots, scabs and other deformities that characterize this skin disease disappeared after an encounter with Jesus Christ, a popular preacher from Nazareth.

Caleb told reporters that he and nine others who had leprosy waited on a roadside all day yesterday for a chance to speak to Jesus. When they finally saw him, Caleb said, Jesus told the men to go into a nearby town and show themselves to the priest.

Under Hebrew law, only a priest can certify lepers as clean and able to live again in society.

Prior to such certification, lepers by law must confine themselves to isolated locales outside of towns. Historically, lepers have been subjected to cruel treatment by those who fear catching the highly contagious disease.

Neither Jesus nor the nine others who Caleb said were also healed could be reached for comment.






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
