## Home Alone 2 is palatable, Dracula's empty

NEW YORK - Mack is back child star Macaulay Culkin, that is and so are those boneheaded bandits in Home Alone 2: Lost in New York (20th

Writer-producer John Hughes and director Chris Columbus play it safe by simply repeating the formula that made Home Alone (1990): the highestgrossing comedy ever.

This outing, as his frazzled family flies off for a Florida vacation, Kevin (Culkin) accidentally boards the wrong plane, ending up alone in the Big Ap-

And who should also turn up in Fun City but good old Harry (Joe Pesci) and Mary (Daniel Stern), the "wet bandits" crafty Kevin outwitted when he was left home alone in Chicago.

Thanks to Dad's (John Heard) credit cards, Kevin's living it up at the Plaza Hotel while Harry and Marv are plotting to knock off a posh toy store at midnight on Christmas Eve.

When Kevin finds out, it's bandits beware, as the 10-year-old lures them to an empty townhouse and unleashes no end of agony on the hapless hooli-

Typical of sequels, more-is-better seems to be the prevailing philosophy, which is precisely why they seldom

This time around, the funny first half leads into a syrupy scenario with a Central Park pigeon lady (Brenda Fricker) Kevin befriends and an endless escalation of assault against the bungling burglars. Although treated comically and shot in cartoon-like fashion, the mock electrocution and brick-throwing from the rooftop won't thrill parents and isn't very funny.

Aside from that, Culkin carries the bouncy sequel on his sturdy little shoulders, enjoying his adventure in the big city and ingeniously outsmarting the hotel staff with more variations on the pranks he employed in the original movie.

And once again, the movie stresses the value of family and friendship, which goes a long way in making what is only a copycat movie both palatable and pleasing.

Because of much slapstick violence and some menace to a child, the U.S. Catholic Conference classification is A-II — adults and adolescents. The Motion Picture Association of America rating is PG — parental guidance suggested.

## **Bram Stoker's Dracula**

In Bram Stoker's Dracula (Columbia), director Francis Ford Coppola turns the haunting vampire legend into an overwrought tale of perverse erotic-

As lavish a production — or as soulless a vision — as this relentlessly sensual version has never been seen before. The vampire's satanic excesses hold center stage, with the power of religious symbols to deflect him just a throwaway in the scheme of things.

The thrust here is on the seduction of repressed Victorian women Lucy (Sadie Frost) and Mina (Winona Ryder), Dracula's reincarnated love.

Gary Oldman's title character is repulsive, with zero sex appeal. Ryder's fatal attraction to him falls flat, as does this treatment of the classic as a doomed love story.

Viewers are in for eye-popping visuals and mannered performances from a rather stilted cast, including Anthony Hopkins as the cunning Professor Van Helsing, brought in to orchestrate Dracula's demise.

The sight of an aged, decrepit Dracula carelessly tossing a screaming baby to his three nearly nude vampire brides — who hungrily pounce upon the infant — is just one repelling image in a movie that has many.

In failing to adequately focus on the primal struggle between good and evil, which is the essence of the horror genre, the stark simplicity and compelling fear inherent in the story gets lost in a swirl of baroque visuals. And, in the end, that consigns this Dracula movie to the category of lush but
