Girls' basketball teams dominated by veterans

It's highly unusual for a letdown to hamper basketball teams returning 80 percent of their starting lineups from championship-caliber squads.

But Our Lady of Mercy and Aquinas Institute have both lost their brilliant "go-to" players from a year ago. Therefore, a slight adjustment period may be required before the Monarchs — minus Sheila Doyle — and the Little Irish — without Amy Reynders — can return to their lofty 1991-92 levels.

Both schools competed in last week's Seneca Falls Tip-Off at Mynderse Academy. Mercy (1-1) opened its season with a 61-40 first-round win over Waterloo on Dec. 3 before falling to Mynderse Academy, 59-56, in the Dec. 5 finals. AQ (0-4) lost both its contests in that tournament, 65-39 to Mynderse and 57-42 to Waterloo.

Meanwhile, Geneva DeSales (2-0) has continued the same late-season success that enabled the Saints to score two huge upsets in last year's Section 5 Class D playoffs. DeSales won its own tournament by defeating Lima Christian, 44-24, on Dec. 3, and Romulus, 40-25, in the Dec. 5 title game.

- Bishop Kearney (1-0) also began the 1992-93 campaign on a positive note, winning 35-27 over visiting Webster on Dec. 4.

Nazareth Academy (0-2) and Elmira Notre Dame (0-4), meanwhile, were still searching for their first wins entering this week's action.

Mercy is coming off a magical 1991-92 season, when the Monarchs went undefeated before losing in the state Class A quarterfinals to Sweet Home of Section 6 (Buffalo area). Season highlights included three memorable nail-biting wins over Aquinas; a 53-36 rout of Brockport in the Section 5 Class A finals; and a final record of 21-1.

Eighth-year Coach Kathy Boughton's four returners are sophomore guard Gina Montesano, senior guard Mimi LaMagna, senior forward Amy Martin and sophomore forward Kelly O'Neill.

Additional Monarchs are sophomore center Teresa Hartman, junior guards Kerri Boroski, Tricia Russell, Michelle McLaren and Cassie Shea; senior guard Cathy Botelho and senior forwards Jenny Gulley and Kristen Soro-

vantage.

Prominent veterans for Aquinas, all seniors, are center Kristina Dudley, forward Sandy Petty and guards Kristen Burgmaster and Amanda lanas.

Rounding out the roster are freshman forwards Giannine Lioi and Maura Whelehan, junior forward Lynda Limma, senior guard/forwards Megan McCabe and Sandy Thies, junior guard/forward Cori Chase and sophomore guards Jenny Werner and Katya Metidieri.

Petty was Aquinas' leading scorer at Seneca Falls, netting 15 points against Mynderse and 12 against Waterloo.

First-year Coach Lori Mattioli is undaunted by the team's 0-4 start. She said that the players just need to become accustomed to taking more active roles than in 1991-92, when AQ posted a 19-4 record and reached the Section 5 Class BB finals.

"I'm dealing with kids who were told (last year) not to shoot; it was dish off to Amy (Reynders) and that was it," said Mattioli, who takes over the program from Tim Reynders after spending two years as AQ's junior varsity coach. "So we're slow out of the gate, but I don't think there's any reason to write us off."

DeSales only finished with a 6-15 record last season, but peaked during the Section 5 Class D playoffs when the Saints — as the 15th seed shocked second-seeded Prattsburg and No. 7 Friendship before being eliminated in the semifinals.

The carryover effect was apparent in last week's tournament, where superb defense spurred the team to a firstplace finish.

"We pride ourselves on our man-toman defense," said 13th-year Coach Steve Muzzi.

All five starters were on the varsity last year. They are senior guards Krista DeVaney and Cecilia McCann, junior guard Emily Parshall, junior forward Lindsay Higgins and sophomore forward Stephanie Nearpass.

Completing the roster are senior guard Shannon Grifa, junior forward Sara Madigan, junior guard/forward Sarah Cataline and freshman guard Emily Krakowiak.

DeVaney led the Saints against Lima Christian with 16 points, and Nearpass contributed a team-high 14 against Romulus.
