## Three teams achieve big hockey wins AQ defeats rival; Knights, BK rule

Based on the gigantic snowfall that recently hit western New York, it seemed fitting that the hockey teams from Aquinas Institute, McQuaid Jesuit and Bishop Kearney were busy snowing their opponents last weekend.

Aquinas, the defending Monroe County Division 1 and Section 5 Class A champion, recorded a 3-1 victory over arch-rival Greece in a game held Saturday, Dec. 12, at Lakeshore Rinks in Greece.

The win kept AQ's league record perfect at 4-0. Little Irish goal-scorers that day were Joe Zabawa, Shane Kavanagh and Jeremy Giordano, with goalie Alex Vigneri making 16 saves.

Earlier in the week, Aquinas recorded a 5-1 victory over Brockport on Dec. 9 at SUNY College at Brockport.

Also victorious in weekend action were McQuaid and Kearney, which each won by sizeable margins.

McQuaid (3-0) stayed unbeaten with an 8-3 rout of Gates-Chili on Dec. 12 at Genesee Valley Ice Arena. The Knights were led by Sean Ritchlin, Marty Reasoner, Larry Pierce and Greg Mulbury, who each scored two goals.


Five nights earlier, the Knights won an 8-5 non-league decision over host West Genesee of Section 3 (Syracuse area). Goalie Ron Lamendola had a busy evening, making 42 saves.

Meanwhile, Kearney (1-2) gained its first win of the season with a 9-2 shellacking of host Batavia Notre Dame on Dec. 12. The Kings' Trevor Smith played a part in seven of his team's nine goals, scoring five times and adding two assists.

The Aquinas boys' swim team won its season-opening meet, recording a 47-38 triumph over host Harley Allendale-Columbia on Dec. 9. Mike McNelis was a double winner for the Little Irish, capturing the 100-yard breaststroke and 200-yard freestyle events.

# Can ND wrestlers repeat title year?

According to its head coach, the Elmira Notre Dame wrestling team may struggle this year with a number of new grapplers in the lineup.

So far, however, the Crusaders are performing just like the squad that won the 1992 Section 4 Class D title.

ND has begun the 1992-93 season with three victories in dual competition. Last week, the Crusaders won 59-6 over visiting Odessa-Montour on Dec. 7, and 45-16 over host Trumansburg on Dec. 9.

Also coming up victorious was McQuaid Jesuit (1-0), which won 34-28 over visiting Franklin in the Knights' season-opening meet on Dec. 10.

Bishop Kearney's season-opening meet against Batavia Notre Dame, scheduled for Dec. 11, was postponed due to bad weather. The Kings' next competition is the Churchville-Chili Tournament this Saturday, Dec. 19.

. . . Notre Dame may have a tough time with its Sullivan Trail Conference competition this year, but Coach Steve Weber thinks the Crusaders have what it takes to claim their second consecutive sectional title.

"I think we can win it if everybody

stays healthy. That's where we were lucky last year," said Weber, whose team also posted a 13-1 record in dual meets last season.

ND returns senior Chris Kamas, the two-time defending sectional champion in the 112-pound weight class. He'll wrestle at 132 this year.

Other top Crusaders are: eighthgrader Chris Steed at 91 pounds; eighth-grader Brett Owen, 98; seventhgrader Nate Hoffman, 105; sophomore Paul Tuite, 112; junior Alex Jordan, 119; sophomore Pete Fusco, 126; freshman Pete Kamas (Chris' brother), 132; freshman Adam Atwell, 138; sophomore Colby Audinwood, 145; sophomore Kevin Wilson, 155; junior John Thatcher, 167; junior Dan Wilson, 177; junior Paul Tomkins, 215; and senior Tim Wilsoncroft, 250.

McQuaid achieved a 9-5 record and the City-Catholic League championship in 1991-92. The Knights feature three grapplers who are coming off excellent seasons: 126-pound junior John Zicari, who went 31-6; 132-pound senior Matt Temple, who finished 26-9; and 177-pound senior John Pernaselli, who ended up 26-5.

Additional prime performers for the Knights are: freshman Paul Carlos-Claus, 98 pounds; freshman Brian Bee-

cher, 105; sophomore John Morris, 112; senior Brian Smallwood (a transfer from Edison Tech), 119; sophomore Nick SanFilippo, 138; junior Jason Wollschleger and senior Matt Knollman, 145; sophomore Adam Lehmann, 155; senior Todd Hinz, 167; and junior Jamie Fishgold and sophomore Eric Mack-Davis, 215.

"If we develop as much the rest of the season as we did in the first month, then we could do quite well," said Coach Lou Teike.

Kearney heads into the Churchville meet with just 10 wrestlers, but that number should increase after a handful of Kings come off the academically ineligible list.

BK's top man is senior Sam Lopez, a 138-pounder who went 17-4 last year.

"He's got a real good shot at winning (Section 5 Class B) sectionals. He should go in as the No. 1 seed," said Coach Vince Asito.

Rounding out the current BK lineup are eighth-grader Carl Zizzo, 98 pounds; junior Matt Kasten, 112; eighth-grader Joe Rozengota, 119; seventh-grader Shad Thomas, 126; sophomore Chris O'Connell, 132; sophomores Tito Torres and Jake Youngman, 145; sophomore Jeff Agnello, 155; and junior Bill Balch, 167.
