You came to Chile to visit us in the person of Bishop Casey first, then Bishop Hogan and those who accompanied him. You have come to us each time

Bishop Clark has paid us a visit.

Imagine yourselves being present, as you are in your sacrifices for us, in the ways we have had the privilege of ministering: Para-liturgies, Baptisms, marriages, funeral responses, Communion to the sick, sacramental preparation, penitential rites, formation of small Christian communities, New evangelization, prayer groups, senior citizen clubs, youth groups, and the everyday service to those who come to our door in need.

All of us are deeply grateful to all of you who have made it possible for us to remain in Chile. May God continue to bless you and reward your great generosity to the missions of the Diocese of Rochester.
