## Paul sails for Rome

After appearing before Governor Festus in court, Paul was granted permission to appeal his case to Caesar in Rome. Paul had been arrested by the Jewish officials for preaching the Gospel to the Gentiles, but because he was also a Roman citizen, he had a right to trial in a Roman court.

Paul and several prisoners boarded a ship that would sail to Rome with guards as well as the sailors.

Autumn winds on the open sea created frequent storms that tossed the boat as if it were a toy. Paul tried to warn the guards and sailors.

"This is going to be a hazardous journey," he said. "We may lose most of our supplies and the ship, and even our own lives are in danger."


"Nonsense," said the ship's captain. "We will sail ahead and spend the winter in Phoenix on the island of Crete. That will be almost the halfway point."

The ship sailed for two weeks through mostly calm weather. But as Crete came into view, the sky darkened and a wind of hurricane force, called the Northeaster, blew ferociously toward the ship.

To avoid the ship being capsized, the crew threw most of the supplies overboard. They tied the lifeboats with extra ropes so that they would not be torn off by the wind.

The ship was shrouded in total darkness, without sight of the sun or any stars, as the storm raged for three days. With the supplies overboard, the men had no food for that whole time.

Paul stood up to speak to the

frightened sailors and prisoners.

"Good men, do not be afraid. An angel of the God I serve visited me last night. He told me the ship will be destroyed, but not one life will be lost. We will be shipwrecked on a nearby island."

For ten more days the ship was blown across the Adriatic Sea as the storm weakened. At midnight a few sailors tried to escape in one of the lifeboats.

When Paul learned of this, he told the captain, "Unless these men stay on the ship, I cannot guarantee anyone's safety." The sailors cut the ropes to all of the lifeboats and let them fall into the sea.

"We have eaten very little for a long time," Paul continued. "Let us eat whatever food we can find."

Paul prayed and gave thanks in the presence of all the men. After they had all eaten, the men threw the remaining supplies overboard. They would not be needed any more.

Almost immediately, the ship crashed into a submerged rock and was completely destroyed. But every guard, sailor, and prisoner reached land safely by clinging to pieces of the ship and drifting with the waves.

The natives of the island they washed up on were friendly and tried to help the men.

Everyone worked together to build a fire. As Paul gathered a pile of branches, a snake bit his hand. He shook off the snake and threw the wood on the fire. The islanders expected Paul to fall down dead, because the snake's bite was deadly.

Not only did the snake's bite have no effect on Paul, but he proceeded to heal all of the sick people on the island in the name of Jesus.

Three months later a ship rescued all the shipwrecked men and brought them to Rome. Paul said to all the Jews there, "God's salvation has been sent to the Gentiles and they will believe."

Paul remained in Rome for two years and preached freely to both Jews and Gentiles.


