#### St. Josephat Ukrainian to host arts festival Aug. 19-22



### Ad calls for women priests

ROCHESTER — One group used Pope John Paul II's visit to Denver last week to voice its disapproval over the treatment of women in the church by taking out a full-page ad in The Denver Post.

The ad was in the form of a letter in which 2,000 signers -- including several individuals and organizations from the Rochester diocese - call for the ordination of women in the Catholic Church.

Sponsored by the Fairfax, Va.-based Women's Ordination Conference, the full-page ad appeared in The Denver Post on Aug. 12, the day the pope arrived in Denver for World Youth Day.

The letter cites Scripture, the teachings of the Second Vatican Council, and historical records concerning women's roles in Christ's life and in the early church — including the reputed ordination of women as deacons, priests and bishops — as well as recent reports of ordained women in the former Czechoslovakia.

"Despite this teaching and tradition," the letter read, "Catholic women today continue to be denied their equal right to test their calls and to minister to God's people: to preach, to teach, to lead, to celebrate the Eucharist, to have major decision-making capabilities in the Roman Catholic Church. This is a painful and sinful denial of the baptismal equality of all believers."

In a telephone interview with the Catholic Courier, Ruth Fitzpatrick, national coordinator of the Women's Ordination Conference, said the names listed in the ad do not represent all of the people who wanted to sign it. She noted that although thousands of people responded to the letter, only those who responded quickly were included in the ad due to space limitations.

Rochester's Corpus Christi Parish, 864 E. Main St. was among the diocesan groups that signed the letter.

The letter was discussed at a parish meeting on July 21, when all those present voted to sign the letter as one community.

"The parish has been so consistent about the ordination of women that we thought we could safely act in the name of the parish," explained Father James B. Callan, the parish's administrator. "It even came up in all the sessions of the Synod."

Among the other letter signers from the Rochester diocese were: Father M. Gerard Hafner, pastor of Caledonia's St. Columba and St. Patrick Parishes; Giovina Caroscio, executive director of the Finger Lakes Office of Social Ministry; Sheryl Zabel, pastoral assistant at Fairport's Church of the Assumption; the Leadership Team of the Sisters of Mercy; Father Ronald E. Gaesser, pastor of St. Catherine of Siena Parish in Ithaca and All Saints Parish in Lansing; Nancy Giordano, pastoral assistant at Rochester's St. Ambrose Parish; and Father William Donnelly, pastor of Elmira's St. Mary Parish.
