The program, however, will survive until at least next year because Dollinger diverted \$25,000 in state money that was originally going to be used for a new Project: CARE minority outreach program into Project: CARE's operating budget.

Until then, Kathy Thomas-Browne, the program's director, noted that Project: CARE will seek other sources of funding from the community. Although area advocates for the elderly — including diocesan Social Ministry — vehemently protested the cutbacks in letters to state and federal officials, Thomas-Browne was skeptical of any reinstatement of last year's grant.

"I don't hold out hope that we're going to get funding from the federal government," she said.


