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

Swim and golf teams in leagues of their own

In a certain sense, the Our Lady of Mercy girls' swimming program and Elmira Notre Dame boys' golf squad are in leagues all their own.

Of the seven Catholic high schools in the diocese, Mercy is the only one with fall swimming. Boys' programs are offered during the winter months at McQuaid Jesuit and Aquinas Institute, and no swim teams of any sort exist at Bishop Kearney, Nazareth Academy, Geneva DeSales or Elmira Notre Dame.

Elmira Notre Dame golf also stands out because the team competes in Section 4, which conducts its golf season in the fall. McQuaid, Aquinas, Kearney and Geneva DeSales, which belong to Section 5, all field golf teams in the spring. All-girls' schools Mercy and Nazareth do not have golf programs.

The Mercy swim squad has posted a 4-6 record in dual meets thus far in 1993. The Monarchs are looking forward to the Section 5 Class B championship meet, scheduled for Nov. 11 and 13 at the University of Rochester.

Leading the Monarchs into sectional competition will be junior Katie St. Martin, who won last year's Class B title in the 100-yard butterfly. She is also a standout in the 100 backstroke, having set a school record in that event earlier this season.

Seventh-grader Nikki Trieste, who has lost only once in the 500 free all season, is another sectional contender. She also swims the 200 free.

Other top Monarchs are seventhgrader Kim Cupini (200 and 500 free), freshman Emmie Ingersoll (200 individual medley and 100 free), sophomore Michelle Moosbrugger (50 free and 100 breaststroke), junior Sarah Schueler (50 free), eighth-grader Christina Brasser (100 back) and freshman Shannon Haire (100 breast).

Highlighting last week's action was Mercy's 49-37 victory over host Wilson Magnet on Oct. 19. The Monarchs' 200 medley relay, comprising St. Martin, Ingersoll, Moosbrugger and Trieste, set a pool record that day with a time of 1 minute, 50.67 seconds.

First-year Coach Todd Yunker noted

that despite his swimmers' inexperience, these Monarchs have already made a significant turnaround from the 1992 season in which they won only one meet.

"The future looks very bright for this team," said Yunker.

Meanwhile, Elmira Notre Dame's golf team has completed the fall season with a 3-7 record in the rugged Sullivan Trail Conference.

The Crusaders will briefly return to action next spring for the Section 4 C-D tournament, which won't be held until May.

Coach A.J. Montanarella, whose Crusaders captured the sectional crown two seasons ago, gives ND a good chance of faring well again at sectional time.

"I think they'll be competitive if they use their heads," he remarked.

Junior Rick Maxa was Notre Dame's No. 1 golfer this past fall. He shot a low nine-hole round of 40, with several 41s as well.

Other top Crusaders are eighthgrader Tim Murray, junior Ryan Delaney, and sophomores Steve Janeski and Jason Peck.

Big plays by Pittsford made the difference in this game. The Panthers' Willie Brazil cut the deepest wound, scoring on a 73-yard touchdown run in the first period and adding a 54-yard TD catch in the third quarter.

Aquinas, which never led, got both its touchdowns after halftime. Jim Miner ran it in from three yards out, and Matt Delly threw to Ryan Hayes on a 70-yard TD pass play.

The loss deflated the Little Irish, who had upset McQuaid in their previous game.

"It was a letdown. We couldn't stay as high as we were the week before,' said Coach Joe Munno.

Penn Yan 14, Kearney 0

The Mustangs got touchdowns in the first and fourth quarters. BK couldn't match that scoring pace as crucial penalties and turnovers victimized the Kings. Especially costly were two fumbles lost inside the Kearney 20-yard line.

"Our kids played a real good game, but Penn Yan hasn't had that many teams score on them this year," said BK Coach Nick Teta.

Penn Yan raised its record to 6-1-1 with the win and qualified as the No. 3 seed for the Section 5 Class B playoffs.
