BRIGHTON - Cancer is not a contagious disease. Yet "contagious" would be a very accurate one-word description for the kind of support Brannon Smith has received in fighting his illness.

Brannon, a 17-year-old senior at McQuaid Jesuit High School, has found his battle to be a true team

"People have come out of the blue. People I've never met before, or never been close to, have sent cards and letters," remarked Brannon.

The Pittsford resident has been fighting cancer since July of 1992, when he was diagnosed with a malignant bone tumor, known as Ewing's Sarcoma, in his left leg.

He underwent chemotherapy and radiation treatments over the ensuing year, yet a biopsy performed this fall revealed that the cancer had spread to Brannon's lungs. Last week he resumed chemotherapy, and is facing the possibility that his leg will be amputated by year's end.

It is a situation seemingly in need of a miracle — and that's exactly what Brannon has set out to find.

He and his family recently visited the shrine of the North American Martyrs in Auriesville, N.Y., where they learned about Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha. This Native American martyr who died in the late 17th century at the age of 24 after devoting her life to smallpox victims in the Montreal area - needs only one more miracle to

achieve sainthood.

Brannon and his well-wishers are praying fervently that his own recovery will serve as that miracle.

Father Lawrence P. Searles, SJ, who serves as chaplain at McQuaid, has led this prayer effort. He has distributed a number of leaflets bearing a handwritten plea for prayer by Brannon on one side, and a novena to Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha on the other.

This information, said Father Searles, has apparently been recopied and circulated all over the country — not

to mention parts of Africa, Japan and Puerto Rico.

"That letter has had a profound effect on people. I've never seen a network of prayer take off like this," the chaplain commented.

Father Searles also conducted a healing Mass — with more than 50 people in attendance — on Oct. 30 at the home of Brannon and his parents, Robert and Kathy:

In addition, a shortened novena is recited at the beginning of each school day by the McQuaid student body.

"The students said it should go over the announcements," noted Father Searles.

Brannon, who played soccer for McQuaid until his sophomore year, has been in and out of school since his illness was discovered. Yet he reports that he's still able to enjoy many of his normal activities.

"You miss out on some things, but overall it's not too bad," he said.

A parishioner at Good Shepherd Church in Henrietta, Brannon added that his Catholic faith has helped him through his ordeal.

"(My faith has) strengthened. I always used to go through the motions, but now it means a lot more to me," he remarked.

Father Searles, who has prayed with Brannon and his family during Brannon's hospital stays, describes the McQuaid senior as a "peaceful-type

"He's very open to the (Holy) Spirit. There's not a rebellious spirit in him at all," said Father Searles.


