Relocation is underway for STOSM

ELMIRA — Several address changes are in the works for the Southern Tier Office of Social Ministry.

STOSM moved its offices in early October to 1420 College Ave., the former Hardinge Bros. manufacturing headquarters. The offices had previously been located at 160 High St., in the former Ss. Peter and Paul School.

The College Avenue facility houses STOSM's executive administration as well as its finance department, justice and peace department, program development offices, and the Worker Owner Resource Center.

Two of the social ministry office's services, Emergency Services and the Family Health Clinic, are continuing to operate out of the High Street building, but only temporarily. STOSM is currently searching for a permanent location in downtown Elmira.

According to Anthony Barbaro, STOSM's executive director, these moves were precipitated by the decision of Eastside Catholic Parish, which currently leases the Ss. Peter and Paul facility to STOSM, to sell the building. Ss. Peter and Paul Church, one of three parishes comprising the Eastside Catholic Parish cluster, is located across the street from the former school building.

The relocation of Emergency Services and the Family Health Clinic could occur by the new year, Barbaro said. He would like these services to remain centered on Elmira's east side — either in separate buildings or under the same roof. Barbaro requested for those with potential facilities available to contact him at 607/734-9784.

In addition, Barbaro noted, the regional offices' current College Avenue location may be only temporary. STOSM is considering building a new facility just off Route 17 in Big Flats, on the same 12 acres of STOSM-owned property where the new Southern Tier Community Food Bank was erected this past year.

"Over the next year, we'll make a determination on that," said Barbaro. "We may decide to build, or we could also decide to stay in our current of**Venerating veterans**

Sister Marie Pierre Semler, MM, 92; religious artist

Sister Marie Pierre Semler, MM, a noted illustrator, painter, sculptor and woodcarver, and a native of Chili, died of cancer on Monday, Oct. 18, 1993, at the Maryknoll Residential Care Facility. She was 92.

Sister Marie Pierre was born to Anthony Semler and Lena Baum Semler and was baptized Bertha Josephine. She was one of five children.

She attended District Three Elementary School in Chili, and spent four years of night school in art training at Rochester Institute of Technology before entering the Maryknoll order on April 30, 1925. She made her first profession of vows in December, 1927, and her final profession three years

later.

Sister Marie Pierre spent her entire career at the Maryknoll Center. Her early works of art included illustrations for *Maryknoll* magazine, paintings and charcoal drawings. She designed and cast the model for the sculptors who carved a stone statue of Mother of the Thorn Crowned, which overlooks the sisters' cemetery at Maryknoll. The statue also marks the grave of Mother Mary Joseph, the order's founder.

A release from her order stated that Sister Marie Pierre had "dedicated herself completely to praising God through the medium of art."

Other creations of Sister Marie Pierre included the wooden outdoor Stations of the Cross at the center. She continued her work until 1992, when she moved into the residential care facility.

Sister Marie Pierre is survived by her niece, Dorothy (George) Hoysic of Wolcott; and her nephew, Eugene Semler, of Churchville. David Hoysic, her grandnephew and his wife, Mary, were with Sister Marie Pierre at the time of her death.

A Mass of the Resurrection was celebrated on Thursday, Oct. 21, at the center. Interment took place at the order's cemetery.
