All-around effort carries Monarchs past BK

When the opponent is Our Lady of Mercy, Jennifer Zambito doesn't have to dig very deep for motivation.

Prior to last Saturday's game at Mercy, no Bishop Kearney player had scored more than 18 points in a game all season. Yet the determination to beat Mercy raged through Zambito so strongly that she went out and scored 20 points in the first half alone, keeping her Kings within one point of their Private-Parochial League rivals at halftime.

But Mercy then revealed the depth and composure that has vaulted the Monarchs to two straight Section 5 Class A championships. With key contributions coming from several players, Mercy held Zambito to one second-half point and pulled away for a 56-39 triumph.

With the win, Mercy clinched at least a tie for the Private-Parochial championship. The Monarchs also won their 10th consecutive game, raising their overall record to 13-2.

Kearney, meanwhile, lost for the first time in six games as the Kings' record slipped to 13-3.

Mercy's tiny gymnasium was mobbed with screaming spectators, many of them hopeful Kearney fans who had seen the Kings take Mercy to back on Jan. 11.

This game was another close one until the fourth quarter. Mercy achieved a 16-10 lead after one quarter, but Zambito, continually driving through a sea of Monarch players for spectacular lay-ups, notched 14 second-quarter points as BK drew within 27-26.

The third quarter featured several lead changes. It was still a one-point game when Zambito, a senior forward, picked up her fourth foul with 2:50 remaining.

> The Monarchs got an unexpected contribution from senior guard Cassie Shea, whose sharp outside shooting resulted in eight fourth-quarter points. She finished with 10 overall, easily surpassing her previous season high of four.

Kelly O'Neill was Mercy's top scorer

with 14 points, and Gina Montesano had 10. Other key performances came from Teresa Hartman, who finished with seven blocked shots; and Tricia Russell, who shut Zambito down after halftime.

"We were in a zone defense, and she (Zambito) was just killing it. So we went man-to-man and put our best defensive player (Russell) on her," said Mercy Coach Kathy Boughton.

BK's Kate Jensen finished with 12 points. She and Zambito accounted for

all but six of the Kings' final point total.

Mercy preceded the Kearney win by rolling to a 69-51 non-league victory over host Brockport last Tuesday, Feb. 1. Four Monarchs scored in double figures that night: Montesano, 19 points; Kerri Boroski, a season-high 17; O'Neill, 16; and Russell, 10.
