## Bosnian artist's work evokes Biblical themes

Jayne Albert, coordinator of 1570 Gallery on East Avenue in Rochester, looks at the paintings of Senad Alic, a graduate of the College of Architecture in Sarajevo, Bosnia-Herzegovina. Alic, a Muslim, is married to a woman who served as a tour guide in Medjugorje, site of reported apparitions of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Together with their two children, the couple is currently exiled in Germany, and the works displayed in this show were made before the war broke out in their homeland. Alic's work is often suggestive of the Creation story, and the use of an apple in many of his scenes symbolizes the modern world's temptation to evil.

## Obituaries

### Sister St. Francis Kane; teacher and noted writer

Sister St. Francis Kane, SSJ, who taught for 17 years at Catholic schools in the Rochester diocese, died on Saturday, Jan. 22, 1994, at the St. Joseph Convent Infirmary in Pittsford. She was 95.

Sister St. Francis, a native of Susquehanna, Pa., entered the Sisters of St. Joseph of Rochester in 1931. She was a graduate of Nazareth Normal School and Nazareth College.

Among the diocesan schools at which Sister St. Francis taught were St. Ambrose, Sacred Heart, St. Francis Xavier, Immaculate Conception, Our Mother of Sorrows, Holy Apostles and Blessed Sacrament in Rochester; St. Francis de Sales in Geneva; St. Mary in Dansville; and Ss. Peter and Paul in Elmira.

Sister St. Francis was a creative writer, having authored plays as well as children's stories and poems that were published in educational journals and newspapers. She was also active in social-justice issues, supporting the poor and neglected.

Ill health forced Sister St. Francis to leave teaching in 1955. She then lived at the SSJ motherhouse and infirmary in Pittsford, and remained active by beautifying the motherhouse grounds.

A funeral Mass for Sister St. Francis was celebrated in the motherhouse chapel on Jan. 25, 1994. Monsignor

William Shannon presided, and was assisted by Father Joseph Donovan.

Sister St. Francis is survived by nephews Padraic Kane of Endwell, N.Y., and John Kane of Philadelphia, Pa.; grandnieces and grandnephews; and her sisters in the St. Joseph congregation.

### Angeline Guzzetta-Jones; college professor

Angeline Guzzetta-Jones, a longtime professor at Nazareth College, died on Monday, Jan. 17, 1994. She was 88.

Mrs. Guzzetta-Jones served as an associate professor for modern languages at Nazareth for 27 years. She was also a 1930 graduate of the college.

Mrs. Guzzetta-Jones taught French, Spanish, Italian and Portuguese at Nazareth. She was a member of the college's President's Society, Founders' Society and Casa Italiana, and was recog-

nized with the Casa Italiana Columbus Day Award in 1987.

Mrs. Guzzetta-Jones also served as foreign-language supervisor for the Greece Central School District from 1960-71.

Mrs. Guzzetta-Jones is survived by her husband, E. Martin Jones of Brighton; and nieces and nephews. Memorial gifts may be made to Nazareth College, the Casa Italiana or Blessed Sacrament Church in Rochester.

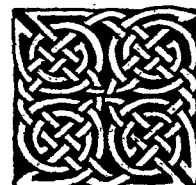
