Nazareth Hall programs heighten awareness

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ROCHESTER - Reading, writing, arithmetic - and enlightenment.

Two recent programs at Nazareth Hall Elementary School, 180 Raines Park, have gone a long way toward transforming the grade pre-K through fifthgrade students into well-informed young women and men.

One project, "READ for N.E.E.D." (Nazareth Elementary Enables a Dream), raised funds for St. Martin's Place, a soup kitchen located at 55 Ontario St. The money was donated by Wegmans Food Markets, which pledged five cents for each book read by Nazareth Hall students and family members.

The book-reading drive, which began in February, was overwhelmingly successful. According to Catherine Kress, assistant director of the elementary school, students and families read more than 15,000 books - far exceeding the \$500 limit set by Wegmans. An awards ceremony on Friday, May 13, will recognize students who completed the pro-

Kress noted that the students could earn extra points by reading designated material. "They didn't just read any books," she said. "We encouraged them to read quality books. They were really reaching for quality literature."

Some youths, such as 7-year-old Steven Smith, didn't need much prompting to get involved in READ for N.E.E.D. A self-described avid book reader, Steven reported that he and his parents devoured 147 books during the drive.

"I used to always read a lot, so it's not a big jump," commented Steven, a second-grader. He added that the project



School principal Sister Mary Ann Laurer, SSJ, added, "By helping others, they're increasing their own sense of giftedness - God's gift to them."

Nazareth Hall also recently celebrated the Week of the Young Child from April 17 through 23. This national event, begun in 1971 by the National Association for the Education of Young Children, serves to direct public attention toward the needs of young children and their

In keeping with this year's theme, "The Future Is In Our Hands," pre-K and kindergarten students - with the assistance of older Nazareth Hall students - designed T-shirts painted with their own hand imprints. The youngsters displayed these shirts at an April 22 concluding assembly entitled "Hats Off to the Young Child." All other students wore hats of their choice that day, and - not unlike a graduation ceremony - launched their headgear into the air during the assembly.

Also during the week, staff members from Pet World brought a variety of animals to the school for pre-K and kindergarten students to see. In addition, a breakfast was held for the pre-K and kindergarten youths and their parents.

Kress acknowledged that activities such as READ for N.E.E.D. and Week of the Young Child are "certainly making (the students) more aware of their community and their world. This makes them more aware of their responsibility.
