Full slate of activities to highlight convention

Event will take place Aug. 5-7

GENESEO - A convention without formal attire or business meetings?

As far as these participants are concerned, all of those confining rituals can be left for an older crowd. Instead, the first-ever Diocesan Youth Convention will be a high-spirited affair, and young diocesan Catholics are eagerly anticipating the three-day event.

Scheduled for Aug. 5-7, the convention will take place at the State University of New York College at Geneseo. According to diocesan youth-ministry coordinator Michael Theisen, approximately 250 youths entering grades 9 through 12 are registered for the weekend. An additional 250 are expected to attend on Saturday, Aug. 6, for the Bishop's Day with Youth proceedings.

The gathering will combine the proceedings of previous Bishop's Days with Youth - held annually at the Rochester Riverside Convention Center until 1993 - with those of the diocesan Junior High Youth Rally, which has taken place at Keuka College each of the past two

As was the case with other Bishop's Days, the Aug. 6 agenda will contain numerous workshops dealing with such issues as relationships, cults, miracles, the media, teens in crisis, peer pressure, being Catholic, drugs and alcohol, and val-

And, once again, Bishop Matthew H. Clark will take the day to address the youths. However, rather than recycle the previous question-and-answer format now used at the Junior High Youth Rally – the bishop will instead lead an Aug. 6 workshop focusing on service and ministry. He will also preside over a closing liturgy at noon on Aug. 7.

Another new wrinkle is the conven-

tion site. Not only is Geneseo State more centrally located for youths throughout the diocese than is Rochester's convention center, but it also offers overnight accommodations.

Theisen pointed out that the campus is a preferred option for several other reasons as well.

"Something we weren't able to do downtown was go outside," he said. "It's also a perfect atmosphere for young people, and being in high school, this would be a unique experience to be at a college. It would give them a flavor of what

The college setting also affords the opportunity for such recreational activities as swimming and volleyball, which have proven to be a big hit during the Junior High Youth Rally.

"We can do dancing and karaoke and swimming in the evening, and again that's something we couldn't do at the convention center because the price limited us to one (afternoon) meal," Theisen acknowledged.

Music and prayer will also constitute major portions of the weekend happenings. One guest performer combining both of these elements will be Steve Angrisano, a nationally recognized speaker and musician from Dallas, Texas. Angrisano performed at Mile High Stadium in Denver during World Youth Day last summer, and he was a keynote speaker at the National Catholic Youth Convention in Philadelphia during the fall.

"(The participants) are going to really experience a wide range of programs and activities specifically designed for Catholic youth," Theisen remarked.
