Running star keeps pace with kids

IRONDEQUOIT - When Dan Lesser decided to be a summer-camp counselor, he probably figured he was suited perfectly for the job.

After all, Lesser has spent the several years attempting to keep up with hordes of energy-packed youngsters.

He has succeeded overwhelmingly in that area, having recently completed an outstanding running career at McQuaid Jesuit High School. As he awaits his freshman year at Brown University this fall, Lesser is filling in his time by working with the day-camp program through the Town of Irondequoit's Parks and Recreation Department.

For those closely associated with the 18-year-old Lesser, his choice for summer employment was not a surprising one.

His work with youth has been extensive, from performing service projects with elementary-school students to serving as mentor for younger athletes coming up through the McQuaid cross-country and track programs.

This past year, Lesser and several of his classmates from McQuaid - an allboys' high school in Brighton – spent volunteer time with co-educational classes at Corpus Christi and Nazareth Hall elementary schools in Rochester.

"It's something I enjoy. It's important for the guys to get involved like that; it's important for kids to see a strong male role model," Lesser observed.


It is for those same reasons that Lesser, a parishioner at St. Salome's Church in Irondequoit, has served as a catechist for the past two years in the parish's preschool "Mini Bible" program.

Making a positive influence has also been vital to Lesser in the world of athletics.

"Last year a lot of our team graduated, so we were young and inexperienced," said Lesser. "It was up to me and Adam (Reitz) to lend our experience."

Lesser learned about the value of mentoring from Bob Bradley, Mc-Quaid's veteran cross-country coach, who took Lesser under his wing when he was a relative unknown with the pro-



gram back in his freshman year.

"He's someone anybody would look up to and want to copy," Lesser said of Bradley. "He's not the kind of coach that just cares about the elite runners."

As it turned out, Lesser and Reitz did reach the elite stage over the next four years. In their senior season, they led McQuaid to a clean sweep of Section 5 championships - in cross-country, indoor track and outdoor track.

Individually, Lesser was equally im-



pressive. He won Section 5 titles in crosscountry, indoor track's 3,200-meter run and outdoor track's 3,200 and 1,600 runs.

At the state level, an illness-plagued Lesser placed a respectable seventh in cross-country last November. He came back at full strength to win the state 3,200 indoor championship in February. of this year before closing out his highschool career with a second-place showing in the outdoor 3,200 in June.

Lesser expects to run both cross-country and track at Brown. He also plans
