Diocesan girls' squads ride crest of title wave

Catholic high school teams in the diocese have heavy representation in the Who's Who of 1994 Girls' Soccer:

• Our Lady of Mercy, defending Section 5 Class A champion.

• Bishop Kearney, defending Section 5 Class CC champion.

• Elmira Notre Dame, defending Section 4 Class D champ.

And fans of these teams could see more of the same by the time November rolls around. Through the end of last week, these three clubs had combined for an 8-1-2 record thus far in '94.

Our Lady of Mercy is coming off a victory in the Harley Allendale-Columbia Tournament. The Monarchs won 5-0 over H-A-C on Sept. 7 and 1-0 over Honeoye Falls-Lima in the Sept. 10 title game. Mercy has started 1994 with a 3-1 record after going 17-5 and reaching the state Class A semifinals a year ago.

Kearney began the new year by winning its own tournament, defeating East 6-0 on Sept. 8 and playing to a 1-1 tie against Wayne on Sept. 10 (the championship was decided on penalty kicks but the game counted officially as a tie.) BK finished 12-9-1 last year, winning the school's first-ever sectional girls' soccer Crown.

Notre Dame has blazed to a 4-0-1 start, winning two tournament championships along the way: their own Lady Cup Tournament and the Cohocton Tournament. The Crusaders had a final 1993 record of 18-3 during a season which included a 14-game winning streak.

Aquinas Institute has started out with a 1-1 mark in 1994 after edging Newark by a 1-0 count in the Newark Tournament's consolation round on Sept. 10. The Little Irish finished 11-5-2 last year.

Nazareth Academy also evened its record at 1-1 by beating Harley Allendale-Columbia 3-0 in the H-A-C Tournament's consolation game on Sept. 10. The Lasers finished 5-8-1 in 1993.

Geneva DeSales' only 1994 game through last week was a 2-1 loss to Whitesville on Sept. 8. The Saints finished 1-15-1 last year, but their 2-1 win over Honeoye snapped a 73-game winless streak for the program.

Here's a look at some of the leading players for each squad:

Senior stars lead Mercy

Striker Gina Montesano and goalie Kelly O'Neill, both seniors, may be the best players at their positions in all of Section 5. Yet Mercy has also proven itself as more than a two-person team: When Montesano missed two games because of blisters, the Monarchs totaled eight goals in wins over Pittsford Mendon and H-A-C.

"That's something we're going to need, because people are really keying on Gina now," observed Mercy Coach Kathy Boughton.
